

# Probate Court Operations During the COVID-19 Pandemic

#### Issue

Summarize the governor's COVID-19 executive order (EO) that addresses Probate Court operations.

### Summary

In March 2020, the governor issued <u>EO 7K</u> which, among other things, suspended non-critical probate court operations and associated requirements.

Specifically, the order suspends:

- certain legal requirements related to probate court proceedings and operations, such as reporting, filing, statutes of limitation, and service of process deadlines;
- 2. all time requirements or deadlines for the probate courts or their judicial officials to issue notices, hold court, hear matters, or render decisions; and
- 3. court facility, location, or venue requirements.

The order also specifically allows the court to hold hearings or render decisions in time frames as the circumstances warrant and the parties' interest

## Probate Court Jurisdiction

The Probate Court has the authority to hear the following types of cases:

- Estates of deceased persons
- Testamentary trusts
- Adoptions
- Conservators
- Commitment of the mentally ill
- Guardians of the persons and estates of minors and intellectually disabled
- Certain name changes

#### Probate Court Operations in Response to **<u>EO 7k</u>**

The Probate Courts have remained available by telephone, eFiling, or for online assistance during the governor's declarations of civil preparedness and public health emergencies.

According to the Probate Courts' website:

- 1. hearings have continued as scheduled and may be conducted by audio or video conference;
- 2. emergency and routine filings may be mailed or eFiled; and
- 3. in-person assistance has become available as town halls begin to expand public hours in accordance with the <u>ReOpen Connecticut guidance</u>.

The availability of in-person assistance at any given local probate court can be determined by calling the court. The Probate Courts' <u>website</u> lists the specific numbers for each local probate court.
