

# COVID-19 Executive Orders Extended Through September 2021

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### Issue

This report describes the COVID-19 executive orders (EOs) that the governor extended through September 30, 2021.

# Summary

The governor declared public health and civil preparedness emergencies on March 10, 2020, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. He renewed and issued new declarations on <u>September 1</u>, 2020, January 26, 2021, April 19, 2021, and May 18, 2021. The legislature ratified the governor's first three declarations and authorized a renewal through May 20, 2021 (<u>SA 21-2</u>), and subsequently July 20, 2021 (<u>SA 21-4</u>).

The legislature again extended the renewal authorization, through March 1, 2022, but required that any new renewals meet durational limitations and receive approval from a majority of each chamber by resolution (<u>SA 21-5</u>). On July 12, 2021, the governor renewed the declaration through September 30, 2021, and both chambers passed resolutions approving it (<u>HR 202 (2021)</u>).

On July 19, the governor issued <u>EO 13</u>, which extends certain orders through September 30, 2021, and allows all other COVID-19 orders to expire on July 20, 2021. Table 1 below lists the extended orders.

## **Extended Orders**

Table 1 lists the executive orders that were extended through September 30, 2021. The governor likewise extended certain agency and municipal emergency orders through this date ( $\underline{E0 \ 13}$ , § 5). All other remaining COVID-19 orders expire on July 20, 2021 ( $\underline{E0 \ 13}$ , § 6).
