

## Questions for the Consumer Protection Commissioner Nominee

## Commissioner of Consumer Protection (CGS §§ 21a-1 & -11)

The Department of Consumer Protection (DCP) commissioner administers a regulatory agency that, among other things:

- 1. investigates consumer complaints about unfair or deceptive trade practices;
- 2. licenses certain professionals and tradespeople;
- 3. oversees the sale of alcoholic beverages;
- 4. works to prevent the sale of adulterated or contaminated food;
- 5. oversees and regulates the recreational cannabis industry;
- 6. regulates the distribution of prescription drugs, including medical marijuana; and
- 7. implements and administers the state's gaming laws.

## Questions

- 1. How has your background and previous experience prepared you for this role?
- 2. What will be your top priorities for the agency during your tenure?
- 3. DCP administers the state's prescription drug monitoring program. Are there aspects of the program that you would like to see changed and, if so, in what way?

- 4. The state is facing a rising number of opioid-related deaths. Are there further restrictions that can be placed on the pharmacy industry or others to prevent these deaths?
- 5. How do you feel that the implementation of the adult-use cannabis law has gone? What changes do you think are needed to the law, if any?
- 6. Are there issues specifically impacting youth that you think DCP needs to focus on more?
- 7. What parts of food and consumables safety enforcement do you think DCP needs to prioritize?
- 8. What are your views on legalized gaming and its impact on the state? Do you think the current regulatory process has sufficient consumer protections built in?
- 9. What is your opinion of the consumer protections enacted in the 2021 gaming expansion act (e.g., the voluntary self-exclusion program, advertising restrictions, and credit and debit card limitations)?
- 10. Are there changes to the state's liquor laws that you would like to see?
- 11. Some have suggested that Connecticut's three-tier alcohol distribution system, adopted after the repeal of Prohibition, is outdated and does not serve consumers well. Do you think the three-tier system is still needed to protect consumers?
- 12. We regularly hear about a shortage of tradespeople in the state. What role do Connecticut's occupational licensing and apprenticeship requirements play? What are the challenges of having reciprocity agreements with other states?
