

State Agencies' Eminent Domain Authority

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Issue

Which state agencies have the authority to exercise eminent domain?

This report updates OLR Report 2008-R-0193.

Summary

The concept of eminent domain refers to a government's authority to take private property for a public purpose. It is recognized in both the Connecticut and U.S. Constitution. Connecticut Constitution, Article First, § 11, states that, "The property of no person shall be taken for public use, without just compensation therefore." And under the Fifth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, "No person shall be...deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation."

In addition to the state itself, the following state agencies have the authority to exercise eminent domain: the Department of Transportation (DOT), Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP), Department of Administrative Services (DAS), Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD), Department of Housing (DOH), and the Office of Policy and Management (OPM). We describe each agency's authority and the law that grants it in detail below.

Eminent Domain Authority

The table below lists statutes that authorize Connecticut and its state agencies to use eminent domain or condemnation. It focuses on statutes that allow the taking of land and briefly describes who may use the power and for what purposes. It does not focus on the procedures or restrictions on the use of eminent domain.

	To conduct the urban sites remediation action program to remediate polluted real property

	To supply water from a river, brook, spring, pond, or lake for convenience or by necessity
CGS § 13b-44	Airports
	To add or expand state airports in an approved plan

	To locate permanent armories as deemed necessary by DAS
<u>CGS § 48-1</u>	Consent to federal land condemnation
	To allow the United States to condemn land for customhouses, courthouses, post offices, arsenals, and other public buildings and for other government purposes

<u>CGS § 13a-73</u>	State highway or highway maintenance storage area
	For the layout, alteration, extension, widening, grade change, or other improvement to a state highway, bridge, highway maintenance storage area, or garage

	For the layout, construction, maintenance, or use of roads or bridges for military purposes

	For constructing ditches, drains, gutters, or other structures to drain a state highway
	Historic preservation
	To preserve historical monuments or memorials that must be removed due to construction on a state highway, including by taking rights of access or exit from land abutting highways

	To maintain trees, shrubs, and vegetation by state highways by condemning an easement

	To develop linear parks along and adjacent to state highways by condemning land (if requested by the DEEP commissioner and, for land more than 50 feet from the highway right-of-way, with the municipal legislative body's approval)

	To use property as part of the Route 11 Greenway by condemnation (upon the request of the Route 11 Greenway Authority Commission, which East Lyme, Montville, Salem, and Waterford may establish)

	To construct and maintain commuter parking facilities by acquiring property
