Substitute House Bill No. 6040

House of Representatives, April 7, 2025

The Committee on Government Administration and Elections reported through REP. BLUMENTHAL of the 147th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT REQUIRING THE STATE COMMISSION ON CAPITOL PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION TO DEVELOP A PROCESS FOR ADDING STATUES TO THE STATE CAPITOL AND ESTABLISHING THE STATE HISTORICAL COMMISSION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- Section 1. Section 4b-60 of the general statutes is repealed and the
 following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1, 2025*):
- 3 (a) There shall be a State Commission on Capitol Preservation and 4 Restoration to consist of twelve members to be appointed as follows: 5 Two members shall be appointed by the Governor, two by the speaker 6 of the House of Representatives, two by the president pro tempore of 7 the Senate, one by the House minority leader, one by the Senate 8 minority leader, two members of the Joint Committee on Legislative 9 Management, one appointed by each of the chairmen of said committee, 10 and one member of the Historic Preservation Council appointed by its 11 chairperson. The Commissioner of Administrative Services, or the

12 commissioner's designee, shall be an ex-officio member of the 13 commission and shall attend its meetings. Vacancies on the commission 14 shall be filled by the original appointing authority for the unexpired 15 portion of the term. The members shall serve without compensation for 16 their services but shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary 17 expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. The commission 18 shall meet at least quarterly, and more often on the call of the chairman 19 or on the written request of a majority of the members. The commission 20 may designate subcommittees to carry out its functions. Any member 21 who fails to attend three consecutive meetings or fails to attend fifty per 22 cent of all meetings held during any calendar year shall be deemed to 23 have resigned.

24 (b) The commission: (1) Shall undertake a continuing review and 25 study of the State Capitol building and grounds, with a view to 26 developing a master plan for the preservation and restoration of the 27 Capitol, including necessary structural changes, consistent with the 28 original historical character of the building, with due regard being given 29 to enhancing the interior and exterior beauty of the building, making 30 better use of existing space and reducing public safety hazards; (2) shall 31 develop a process for identifying and commissioning additional statues 32 to be added to the exterior of the State Capitol building that reflect the 33 diversity, character and accomplishments of the state; (3) may consult 34 with state, federal or private agencies with respect [thereto] to the duties 35 set forth in this subsection, and disseminate information on its activities; 36 and [(3)] (4) shall report on its activities to the Joint Committee on 37 Legislative Management annually or as often as the committee shall 38 direct. The Department of Administrative Services shall provide 39 professional staff assistance to the commission when available. If such 40 assistance cannot be provided within a reasonable time, the commission 41 may, with the approval of the Joint Committee on Legislative 42 Management, retain technical advisors to assist in reviewing project 43 plans and work.

(c) The commission is authorized to accept gifts, donations and grantsfrom the federal government or other public or private sources for the

46 purpose of such preservation and restoration.

47 (d) The Joint Committee on Legislative Management may undertake 48 capital expenditure programs for which capital funds are authorized, in 49 connection with such preservation and restoration, including, but not 50 limited to, implementing the process developed pursuant to subdivision 51 (2) of subsection (b) of this section to commission additional statues. 52 Such programs shall be carried out by the committee, pursuant to plans 53 and specifications approved by the commission and in accordance with 54 the bidding procedures in part II of chapter 60. The commission shall 55 adopt regulations establishing basic artistic standards in keeping with 56 the original historical character of the Capitol to assist the committee in 57 the preparation of plans and specifications.

(e) The commission shall be an independent body within theLegislative Department for administrative purposes only.

60 Sec. 2. (*Effective from passage*) Not later than February 1, 2026, the State 61 Commission on Capitol Preservation and Restoration shall (1) develop 62 a plan for the installation of exterior placards or other signage around 63 the exterior of the State Capitol building to provide a written historical 64 explanation of the various statues and other markers on the exterior of 65 the State Capitol building for the public, and (2) submit such plan to the 66 Joint Committee on Legislative Management.

67 Sec. 3. (NEW) (Effective July 1, 2025) (a) There is established a State 68 Historical Commission, which shall be an independent body within the 69 Legislative Department for administrative purposes only. The 70 commission shall examine and make recommendations to the 71 executive and judicial branches on questions of legislative, 72 memorialization and commemoration related to Connecticut and 73 United States history.

(b) The commission shall consist of the following members: (1) One
appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives; (2) one
appointed by the majority leader of the House of Representatives; (3)
one appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate; (4) one

78 appointed by the majority leader of the Senate; (5) one appointed by the 79 minority leader of the House of Representatives; (6) one appointed by 80 the minority leader of the Senate; (7) two appointed by the Governor; 81 (8) two appointed by the chairpersons of the joint standing committee 82 of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to 83 government administration, with one member appointed by each 84 chairperson; (9) two appointed by the ranking members of the joint 85 standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of 86 matters relating to government administration, with one member 87 appointed by each ranking member; (10) the Chief Court Administrator, 88 or a designee; and (11) the State Historian. Appointed members shall be 89 scholars in the areas of history, literature, law or philosophy with an 90 affiliation with an accredited institution of higher education located in 91 this state. Any member of the commission appointed under 92 subdivisions (1) to (9), inclusive, of this subsection may be a member of 93 the General Assembly.

94 (c) All initial appointments to the commission shall be made not later
95 than September 1, 2025. Appointed members of the commission shall
96 serve for three-year terms which shall commence on the date of
97 appointment. Members shall continue to serve until their successors are
98 appointed.

(d) The speaker of the House of Representatives and the president
pro tempore of the Senate shall select the chairperson of the commission
from among the members of the commission. Such chairperson shall
schedule the first meeting of the commission, which shall be held not
later than September 15, 2025.

(e) The administrative staff of the joint standing committee of the
General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to government
administration shall serve as administrative staff of the commission.

(f) Any vacancy shall be filled by the appointing authority. Any
vacancy occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled for the
balance of the unexpired term.

(g) A majority of the commission shall constitute a quorum for thetransaction of any business.

(h) The members of the commission shall serve without
compensation, but shall, within the limits of available funds, be
reimbursed for expenses necessarily incurred in the performance of
their duties.

116 (i) The commission shall have the following powers and duties: To 117 (1) issue reports and recommendations to all three branches of 118 government concerning historical questions of memorialization and 119 commemoration related to Connecticut and United States history, either 120 upon the request of any executive, legislative or judicial department, 121 board, commission or other agency of the state or upon its own 122 initiative; (2) obtain from any executive, legislative or judicial 123 department, board, commission or other agency of the state such 124 assistance and data as necessary and available to carry out the purposes 125 of this section; (3) accept any gift, donation or bequest for the purpose 126 of performing the duties described in this section; and (4) perform such 127 other acts as may be necessary and appropriate to carry out the duties 128 described in this section.

129 (j) Not later than February 1, 2026, and annually thereafter, the 130 commission shall submit a report, in accordance with the provisions of 131 section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the Governor and the joint 132 standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of 133 matters relating to government administration. Such report shall 134 include, but need not be limited to, a summary of the activities of the 135 commission during the prior year and any policy changes and 136 amendments to the general statutes necessary to implement the 137 recommendations of the commission.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

Explanation

The bill creates a State Historical Commission and allows members to be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their duties resulting in a potential minimal cost to the Office of Legislative Management to the extent reimbursements are requested.

The bill also adds to the duties of the State Commission on Capitol Preservation resulting in no fiscal impact to the state because the Commission has the expertise to meet the requirements of the bill.

The Out Years

The annualized ongoing fiscal impact identified above would continue into the future subject to inflation.

OLR Bill Analysis sHB 6040

AN ACT REQUIRING THE STATE COMMISSION ON CAPITOL PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION TO DEVELOP A PROCESS FOR ADDING STATUES TO THE STATE CAPITOL AND ESTABLISHING THE STATE HISTORICAL COMMISSION.

SUMMARY

This bill expands the State Capitol Preservation and Restoration Commission's duties by requiring it to develop a process for identifying and commissioning additional statues for the State Capitol building exterior to reflect the state's diversity, character, and accomplishments. It allows the Legislative Management Committee to use capital funds to implement this process.

The bill also requires the commission, by February 1, 2026, to (1) develop a plan for installing placards or other signs around the State Capitol Building's exterior to give the public a written historical explanation of the various statues and other markers on the building exterior and (2) submit the plan to the Legislative Management Committee.

Additionally, the bill creates a 14-member State Historical Commission to examine and make recommendations to the legislative, executive, and judicial branches on questions of memorialization and commemoration related to Connecticut and U.S. history. The commission's members are (1) certain public officers or (2) scholars in certain fields affiliated with an in-state higher education institution.

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2025, except that the provision requiring a plan for exterior signage takes effect upon passage.

IDENTIFYING AND COMMISSIONING ADDITIONAL STATUES

Existing law requires the State Capitol Preservation and Restoration

Commission to continually review and study the State Capitol building and grounds with a view to developing a master plan for preserving and restoring it consistent with the building's original historical character.

The bill requires the commission to develop a process for identifying and commissioning additional statues to for the State Capitol building exterior to reflect the state's diversity, character, and accomplishments. It allows the commission to consult with state, federal, or private agencies in developing the process.

The bill allows the Legislative Management Committee to undertake capital expenditure programs to implement this process. As under existing law, the committee may do so using capital funds and following (1) plans and specifications approved by the commission and (2) state bidding laws.

STATE HISTORICAL COMMISSION

Membership

The bill establishes the commission as an independent body within the legislative branch for administrative purposes only. Under the bill, the commission's membership consists of the chief court administrator, or their designee, the state historian, and 12 appointed members as follows: (1) two by the governor and (2) one each by the six legislative leaders and the Government Administration and Elections (GAE) Committee chairpersons and ranking members. Appointed members must be scholars in history, law, literature, or philosophy and affiliated with an in-state higher education institution. They may be legislators.

The bill requires that (1) initial appointments be made by September 1, 2025, and (2) the first meeting be held by September 15, 2025. Members serve three-year terms from their appointment date and continue to serve until the appointment of their successors. The appointing authority must fill any vacancy, and a vacancy occurring during a term must be filled for the rest of the unexpired term. The House speaker and Senate president pro tempore must select the

chairperson, who must schedule the first meeting. A majority of the membership constitutes a quorum to transact business.

The bill requires that commission members serve without compensation but allows reimbursement for necessary expenses within available funds.

Powers and Duties

The bill authorizes the commission to:

- 1. issue reports and recommendations to all three branches of government on historical questions of memorialization and commemoration related to Connecticut and U.S. history, on its own initiative or upon request of an agency, department, board, or commission in any of the three branches;
- 2. obtain assistance and data from these government entities as necessary and available to carry out the commission's purposes;
- 3. accept any gift, donation, or bequest to perform its duties; and
- 4. perform other acts as may be necessary and appropriate to carry out its duties.

It requires the commission, starting by February 1, 2026, to report annually to the governor and GAE Committee. The report must include a summary of the commission's activities during the previous year and any policy or legislative changes needed to implement its recommendations. Finally, the bill requires the GAE Committee staff to serve as the commission's administrative staff.
