Substitute House Bill No. 6900

House of Representatives, March 3, 2025

The Committee on Children reported through REP. PARIS of the 145th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT ESTABLISHING A TASK FORCE TO STUDY CHILD DEVELOPMENT AND PERINATAL DEPRESSION SCREENING TOOLS AND DATA SHARING SYSTEMS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. (*Effective from passage*) (a) There is established a task force 2 to develop (1) guidelines for the use of (A) developmental screening 3 tools by physicians and other health care clinicians for children from 4 birth to age three, and (B) screening tools to identify maternal perinatal depression during well-child pediatric appointments, and (2) an 5 6 Internet-based system for the collection, analysis and sharing of data 7 obtained from such developmental and perinatal depression screenings 8 among physicians, other health care clinicians and early intervention 9 programs, for the purposes of measuring progress and outcomes, 10 improving services and identifying trends and areas of need.

11 (b) The task force shall consist of the following members:

12 (1) One appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives,

13 who shall be a representative of the state's chapter of a national 14 association of providers of pediatric medicine; 15 (2) One appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate, who 16 shall be a representative of an association of community health centers 17 in the state; 18 (3) One appointed by the majority leader of the House of 19 Representatives, who shall have expertise in the creation of tools to 20 facilitate data analysis and the sharing of data; 21 (4) One appointed by the majority leader of the Senate, who shall be 22 a representative of an organization that promotes awareness, 23 prevention and treatment of maternal perinatal mental health issues; 24 (5) One appointed by the minority leader of the House of 25 Representatives, who shall be a representative of an organization that 26 advocates for the care of children with behavioral and developmental 27 needs; 28 (6) One appointed by the minority leader of the Senate, who shall be 29 a representative of an organization that advocates for improved 30 outcomes for children in the state: 31 (7) The Commissioner of Early Childhood, or the commissioner's 32 designee; 33 (8) The Commissioner of Social Services, or the commissioner's 34 designee; and 35 (9) The Commissioner of Mental Health and Addiction Services, or 36 the commissioner's designee. 37 (c) Any member of the task force appointed under subdivision (1), 38 (2), (3), (4), (5) or (6) of subsection (b) of this section may be a member 39 of the General Assembly.

(d) All initial appointments to the task force shall be made not laterthan thirty days after the effective date of this section. Any vacancy shall

42 be filled by the appointing authority.

(e) The speaker of the House of Representatives and the president pro
tempore of the Senate shall select the chairpersons of the task force from
among the members of the task force. Such chairpersons shall schedule
the first meeting of the task force, which shall be held not later than sixty
days after the effective date of this section.

(f) The administrative staff of the joint standing committee of the
General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to children
shall serve as administrative staff of the task force.

51 (g) Not later than January 1, 2026, the task force shall submit a report 52 on its findings and recommendations, including, but not limited to, the 53 guidelines developed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section and 54 recommendations for legislation necessary to implement and 55 administer the system described in said subsection, to the joint standing 56 committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters 57 relating to children, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a 58 of the general statutes. The task force shall terminate on the date that it 59 submits such report or January 1, 2026, whichever is later.
