Substitute House Bill No. 6951

*House of Representatives, May 8, 2025*

The Committee on Appropriations reported through REP. WALKER of the 93rd Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

## **AN ACT CONCERNING CHILDREN'S BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES.**

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. (*Effective July 1, 2025*) (a) The Transforming Children's
- 2 Behavioral Health Policy and Planning Committee, established
- 3 pursuant to section 2-137 of the general statutes, shall conduct a study
- 4 concerning existing behavioral health services for children and
- 5 anticipated demand for such services in the future. Such study shall
- 6 include, but need not be limited to, (1) the rates of utilization of the
- 7 following providers of behavioral health services for children: (A) The
- 8 United Way of Connecticut 2-1-1 Infoline program, (B) 9-8-8 National
- 9 Suicide Prevention Lifeline, (C) mobile crisis intervention services,
- 10 urgent crisis centers, as defined in section 19a-179f of the general
- 11 statutes, (D) subacute crisis stabilization centers, and (E) hospital
- 12 emergency departments, (2) outreach and marketing strategies utilized
- 13 by the service providers listed in subdivision (1) of this subsection, (3)
- 14 common sources of patient referrals to such service providers, (4) the

15 allocation of state and other financial resources to such service  
16 providers, and (5) the anticipated demand for behavioral health services  
17 for children into the future.

18 (b) Not later than January 1, 2026, the Transforming Children's  
19 Behavioral Health Policy and Planning Committee shall submit a report,  
20 in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes,  
21 to the joint standing committees of the General Assembly having  
22 cognizance of matters relating to developmental services, public health  
23 and children. Such report shall include an analysis of (1) data collected  
24 in conducting the study required pursuant to subsection (a) of this  
25 section, and (2) recommendations to improve the delivery of behavioral  
26 health services for children and meet anticipated demand for such  
27 services into the future.

28 Sec. 2. (*Effective July 1, 2025*) (a) The Transforming Children's  
29 Behavioral Health Policy and Planning Committee established pursuant  
30 to section 2-137 of the general statutes shall, in collaboration with (1) a  
31 state-wide association of school-based health centers, develop a survey  
32 for administration at such centers that is designed to obtain information  
33 from such centers concerning existing data collection practices and the  
34 anticipated challenges and opportunities presented by the  
35 implementation of more comprehensive data collection systems at such  
36 centers, and (2) the Commissioner of Public Health, develop appropriate  
37 reporting requirements for school-based health centers to determine  
38 and respond to the needs of such centers. The committee may contract  
39 with a consultant to develop the survey required pursuant to this  
40 subsection.

41 (b) Not later than January 1, 2026, the Transforming Children's  
42 Behavioral Health Policy and Planning Committee shall submit a report,  
43 in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes,  
44 to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having  
45 cognizance of matters relating to public health. Such report shall  
46 include, but need not be limited to, the survey and reporting  
47 requirements developed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

### **Explanation**

The bill makes various requirements of the Transforming Children's Behavioral Health Policy and Planning Committee resulting in the potential cost described below.

**Section 1** requires the committee to conduct a study concerning existing behavioral health services for children and anticipated demand for future services resulting in no fiscal impact because the Committee has the necessary expertise and resources to conduct the study.

**Section 2** requires the committee to develop a survey for administration at school-based health centers and allows the committee to contract with a consultant resulting in a potential cost to the Office of Legislative Management (OLM)<sup>1</sup>. If the committee decides to contract with a consultant, there is a potential cost to OLM of up to \$10,000<sup>2</sup>.

Additionally, this section requires the Department of Public Health

(DPH) to develop appropriate reporting requirements for school-based health centers resulting in no fiscal impact to the state because DPH has the expertise to meet the requirements of the bill.
