Substitute House Bill No. 6964

House of Representatives, April 2, 2025

The Committee on Public Safety and Security reported through REP. BOYD of the 50th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT ESTABLISHING A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE PROVISION OF EMERGENCY TREATMENT TO AND TRANSPORTATION OF AN ANIMAL THAT IS INJURED IN THE PERFORMANCE OF ITS DUTIES UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF A PEACE OFFICER.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. (*Effective from passage*) (a) There is established a task force to study the provision of emergency treatment to, and transportation of, an animal that is injured in the performance of its duties under the supervision of a peace officer, as defined in section 53a-3 of the general statutes. Such study shall include, but need not be limited to, an examination of:

- 7 (1) The circumstances under which the emergency treatment and 8 transportation of such an animal is appropriate;
- 9 (2) The training that should be required of emergency medical 10 services personnel, as defined in section 19a-175 of the general statutes, 11 in the provision of such services, including, but not limited to, first aid,

39 relating to public safety and security; 40 (9) One appointed by the House ranking member of the joint standing 41 committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters 42 relating to public safety and security; 43 (10) One appointed by the Senate ranking member of the joint 44 standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of 45 matters relating to public safety and security; 46 (11) The Commissioner of Emergency Services and Public Protection, 47 or the commissioner's designee; and 48 (12) The Commissioner of Public Health, or the commissioner's 49 designee. 50 (c) Any member of the task force appointed under subdivision (1), 51 (2), (3), (4), (5), (6), (7), (8), (9) or (10) of subsection (b) of this section may 52 be a member of the General Assembly. 53 (d) All initial appointments to the task force shall be made not later 54 than thirty days after the effective date of this section. Any vacancy shall 55 be filled by the appointing authority. 56 (e) The speaker of the House of Representatives and the president pro 57 tempore of the Senate shall select the chairpersons of the task force from 58 among the members of the task force. Such chairpersons shall schedule 59 the first meeting of the task force, which shall be held not later than sixty 60 days after the effective date of this section. 61 (f) The administrative staff of the joint standing committee of the 62 General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to public safety 63 and security shall serve as administrative staff of the task force. 64 (g) Not later than January 1, 2026, the task force shall submit a report 65 on its findings and recommendations to the joint standing committee of 66 the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to public 67 safety and security, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a

- of the general statutes. The task force shall terminate on the date that it
- 69 submits such report or January 1, 2026, whichever is later.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:
