Substitute House Bill No. 7051

House of Representatives, April 1, 2025

The Committee on Public Safety and Security reported through REP. BOYD of the 50th Dist., Chairperson of the Committee on the part of the House, that the substitute bill ought to pass.

AN ACT CONCERNING THE BLACK BEAR POPULATION IN THE STATE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

- 1 Section 1. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) (a) The Commissioner of
- 2 Energy and Environmental Protection, in conjunction with the
- 3 Commissioner of Emergency Services and Public Protection, shall
- 4 develop, and thereafter revise as necessary, a black bear management
- 5 plan to ensure public safety and the protection of property and maintain
- 6 a sustainable black bear population in the state. Such plan shall include,
- 7 but need not be limited to: (1) An assessment of the current black bear
- 8 population, and the desired future status of such population, in various
- 9 regions of the state, (2) recommendations for minimizing human and
- 10 black bear conflicts, (3) guidelines for public education initiatives
- 11 concerning management and conflict avoidance, (4) strategies for
- 12 nonlethal black bear deterrence and response, (5) an evaluation of
- 13 potential black bear population control measures, (6) protocols for the
- 14 public, the state and agencies, instrumentalities and political

15 subdivisions of the state to manage black bears that pose an imminent
16 threat to public safety or property, (7) recommendations for waste
17 management practices to reduce black bear attractants, and (8) strategies
18 for coordinating with municipalities, law enforcement officers and
19 interested parties to improve black bear safety measures.

20 (b) Not later than July 1, 2026, the Commissioner of Energy and
21 Environmental Protection shall submit the plan, in accordance with the
22 provisions of section 11-4a of the general statutes, to the joint standing
23 committees of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters
24 relating to public safety and the environment. If such plan is revised, the
25 commissioner shall submit such revised plan to said committees not
26 later than thirty days after the development of such revised plan.

27 Sec. 2. (NEW) (*Effective from passage*) If the Commissioner of Energy
28 and Environmental Protection determines that the black bear
29 population in the state poses a threat to public safety, the commissioner
30 may request the Governor to issue an executive order to authorize any
31 appropriate black bear population control measures.

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:

OLR Bill Analysis**sHB 7051*****AN ACT CONCERNING THE BLACK BEAR POPULATION IN THE STATE.*****SUMMARY**

This bill requires the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) commissioner to create, and change as needed, a black bear management plan. He must do so in conjunction with the emergency services and public protection commissioner. The plan is intended to help ensure public safety, protect property, and sustain the state's black bear population. The plan must include:

1. an assessment of this bear population, including what the future population should be across the state;
2. recommended ways to reduce conflicts with humans;
3. guidelines for public education initiatives that address black bear management and human-bear conflict avoidance;
4. plans for how to respond to these bears and deter them with nonlethal methods;
5. an evaluation of potential black bear population control methods;
6. plans and procedures for the public and state and local entities to manage black bears that pose an imminent threat to public safety or property;
7. recommended trash management practices to reduce attracting bears; and
8. strategies to coordinate with towns, law enforcement, and other interested parties to improve safety measures.

DEEP must submit the plan to the Public Safety and Security and Environment committees by July 1, 2026, and if changed, 30 days or less from when the change is completed.

The bill also specifically allows the DEEP commissioner, if he determines that this bear population poses a public safety threat, to ask the governor to issue an executive order permitting any appropriate black bear population control measures.
