REASONS FOR BILL:

To further create more transparency and "accountability" between the state legislature and Office of Policy & Management (OPM), the bill asks for the secretary of OPM to provide summaries that funds not currently in use by agencies. It is designed to try and be as proactive as possible to prepare for future economic predictions, thus giving more financial security to tax paying constituents.

PROPOSED SUB. LANGUAGE

Section 1: No was changed to "not later than Dec. 15th each year."

The deadline was changed to Nov. 20th.

Knopp, Alex, Former State Rep and Mayor

They hope the recommendations they made in their testimony will help to give more flexibility and efficient management to they guardrail system for the future.

Ben Shaiken writes in support of the bill, listing a variety of ways funds have not been utilized by organizations and as a result has hindered funds for many non-profit organizations. And because of these unused funds can also not reflect accurate numbers to how much these funded organizations/agencies use the money given to them by the state.

Jeanette Luna submits testimony, while in support of a bill, has a few thoughts on certain material within the current bill. She shares that she would like to recommend removing the existing analysis of possible use of surplus funds and that by taking this section out of the bill, it could be replaced with an analysis that better works with the Budget Reserve Fund, reflecting a much broader look at the state's fiscal landscape.
