REASONS FOR BILL:

Over the course of the 20th Century, Chief Harold Tantaquidgeon established himself as a pillar of the Native American community in Eastern Connecticut. A member of the Mohegan Tribe, joined the Coast Guard as a young man and quickly became one of the youngest chief petty officers in the United States. In World War II, while serving with the Air Force, his plane was shot down over New Guinea, and he kept his crew alive for twenty-three days. Upon returning to his family farm he lectured at the Tantaquidgeon Museum in Montville, where he played an integral role in preserving Native American heritage. This resolution seeks to honor the dedication of Chief Tantaquidgeon to his tribe, his state, and his country.
