REASONS FOR BILL:

This bill would authorize the use of funds for schools and childcare centers to add security infrastructure or security communication devices. This would also include the cost of training staff and personnel in how to use this security infrastructure. These schools may apply for a grant to cover the costs of this infrastructure. This bill expands the funds currently available through the School Security Competitive Grant Program.

The expansion of this program to allow communication systems to count as security devices further allows schools to develop their security systems. These devices will allow educators, parents, and first responders to communicate effectively in an emergency.
