REASONS FOR BILL:

This bill aims to help people not already receiving childcare assistance by capping childcare costs at seven percent of that family's annual income. The Early Childhood Care and Education fund Advisory Commission would subsidize costs for participating care centers. It would be required that the Commission tracks how many families and providers are eligible and how many are utilizing the program. Employers at the places providing childcare will implement a one and a half percent tax on payroll expenses, and that money will go to the Commission. Employers would also receive a grant for the salary enhancement of their employees. There would be an online portal in which families can check eligibility and enroll.

The goal of this bill is to make childcare more affordable for families without that help being at the cost of childcare workers. While this bill would cap the cost of childcare for working families, it would increase the pay of childcare workers.

NATURE AND SOURCES OF OPPOSITION:

<u>Maegan Adams</u> opposes this bill because while they agree with the objectives of the bill, they take issue with the 1.5% tax and from the separation of the Workforce Childcare fund from

the general Early Childhood Care and Education fund. They believe these things would contribute to issues with funding for childcare providers down the line.

<u>Connecticut Voices for Children Executive Director, Emily Byrne</u> opposes this bill because of the creation of a separate fund. They agree with the objectives of this bill but disagree with the way the bill would achieve those objectives. They believe the payroll tax places an unnecessary burden on small businesses.

<u>Angelica Cervantes</u> opposes this bill because they think it is unnecessary to create a new fund when there is already an existing fund. They also do not think the 1.5% tax is fair to childcare providers.

<u>Connecticut Early Childhood Alliance executive Director, Merrill Gay</u> opposes this bill because they do not believe the bill is effective. The grants to help with payroll enhancements would come months after the pay increases are required. This bill would also only help parents who are currently working and not parents who need childcare so they can enter the workforce. They are also concerned about the increase in employer's costs due to the 1.5% tax.

<u>Connecticut AFL-CIO President, Ed Hawthorne</u> opposes this bill because they believe the 1.5% tax is unnecessary. While they support the goals of this bill, they believe that an additional tax should not be enacted while there is a projected surplus.

<u>Jacqueline Oulloa</u> opposes this bill because of its timeline. It would require pay increases for workers before any funding is given to employers. They also do not like the idea of a new fund because they already fought hard to get family childcare providers a say in the existing one.

<u>Sleeping Giant Daycare, Inc. Director, Edie Reichard</u> opposes this bill because the timeline may bankrupt childcare providers. A different timeline is needed to allow providers to receive funding and adjust before they can pay their employees more. The 1.5% tax is a concern as well because it may burden providers unnecessarily. They support the intent behind this bill and would support the bill with different language.

<u>The Connecticut Project Action Fund Policy and Advocacy Strategist, Coralys Santana</u> opposes this bill because while they support the benefits of this bill, they cannot support the 1.5% tax. They would support this bill with an alternate revenue fund.

<u>Andrea Valdez</u> opposes this bill because it would require employers to increase wages for their employees before funding is given to them. Their own home daycare center would also suffer from the 1.5% tax.

<u>Maria Amado</u> opposes this bill because requiring wage increases before funds are distributed would hurt employers, and so would the 1.5% tax. Also, creating a new fund with a new board is not necessary.

<u>Christopher Badenhop</u> opposes this bill because the tax outlines in the bill would harm small businesses.

<u>Mary Cecchinato</u> opposes this bill because the timeline of raising wages would harm small childcare businesses. They payroll tax would harm them as well.

<u>Connecticut Business and Industry Association Public Policy Associate, Jenna Grasso</u> opposes this bill because of the 1.5% payroll tax. They would support the bill with this section removed.

<u>Connecticut Association for the Education of Young Children Executive Director, Karen</u> <u>Rainville</u> opposes this bill. They support the bill as a concept and appreciate the objectives of the bill. However, they are opposed to the creation of a new fund and would rather bolster the existing fund. They are also opposed to the 1.5% tax as it would be a burden on employers who are already facing uncertainty in funding. This burden could lead to cut hours or laying off employees.

<u>Connecticut Association of Public School Superintendents Executive Director Fran</u> <u>Rabinowitz</u> opposes this bill because they believe the ideas expressed in the bill would be better implemented in Governor Lamont's Early Childhood Endowment.

<u>Adrean Rodriguez</u> opposes this bill because it would require businesses to increase wages before they receive the funding necessary to do so. They also believe there should be a less regressive tax than the payroll tax that is currently outlines. With these things fixed, they would support the bill.

<u>Rosa Santana</u> opposes this bill because the deadline for increasing wages comes before when money would be distributed to care providers, the payroll tax is a burden on care providers, and a new fund and board are unnecessary.
