### Explanation

This correction replaces a previous version of the note and addendum. This bill authorizes all eligible voters to apply for and cast

an absentee ballot resulting in the costs described below.

The bill results in a cost to the Secretary of the State (SOTS) in FY 27 of up to \$135,000<sup>2</sup> in FY 26 and \$25,000<sup>3</sup> in FY 27. The exact cost will depend on the number of additional<sup>4</sup> electors who choose to vote absentee as a result of the legislation<sup>5</sup>.

The bill additionally, results in a total cost to municipalities of up to \$650,000 in FY 26<sup>6</sup> and up to \$1,050,000 in FY 27 for printing, postage, labor, and storage costs to process the expected increase in absentee voting. The exact cost will vary by town depending on the number of additional absentee ballots printed, applications mailed, and labor and resources required to facilitate additional<sup>7</sup> absentee voting.

#### The Out Years

The annualized ongoing fiscal impact identified above would continue into the future subject to inflation, voter preference of voting method, and participation.

This would represent an estimated maximum absentee voter increase of 234,365 for State Elections; 108,540 for a State Election Primary; 121,016 for a Municipal Election and 79,530 for Municipal Primaries.
