RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING CHIEF HAROLD TANTAQUIDGEON.

Resolved by this Assembly:

1 WHEREAS, Chief Harold Tantaquidgeon was admired throughout

2 Connecticut, both for his devotion to the culture and history of Native

3 Americans in this state and also for his brave service with the armed

4 forces of the United States; and

5 WHEREAS, Harold Albert Tantaquidgeon was born on June 18, 1904,

- 6 in Mohegan, Connecticut, a citizen of the Mohegan Tribe and the fourth
- 7 of seven children of John Tantaquidgeon and Harriet Fielding; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Harold's formal education ended with the completion of 9 eighth grade, but he learned a great many other skills, including how to 10 survive in the wilderness, from his father that would prove invaluable 11 later in his life; and
- WHEREAS, Harold was too young to enlist when World War I broke
 out so he joined the Home Guard in Norwich, but soon realized as he
 observed the docks whenever he traveled through New London that his

15 future would be with the United States Coast Guard; and

16 WHEREAS, in 1921, when Harold was seventeen years of age, he 17 reported to the United States Customs House in New London and told 18 a recruiting officer that he wished to join the Coast Guard and serve 19 aboard *Pequot*, a ship his uncle had served aboard when it was used for 20 fishing and whaling purposes; and

21 WHEREAS, *Pequot*'s new purposes were to lay and repair 22 underwater telegraph cables along the East and Gulf Coasts of the 23 United States and answer calls for assistance from lighthouses and 24 remote islands; and

WHEREAS, Harold advanced to seaman first class after two years on *Pequot* and would shortly thereafter, while serving on *Pequot II*, advance
to quartermaster; and

WHEREAS, in 1927, when Harold was twenty-three years of age, he was put in charge of the seventy-five-foot cutter, *CG-289*, becoming one of the youngest chief petty officers in the history of the United States Coast Guard and the first Native American to achieve the rank of chief boatswain's mate; and

WHEREAS, *CG-289*'s patrol of Long Island Sound and the coast of
New York helped enforce the country's liquor laws during Prohibition;
and

WHEREAS, Harold remained on *CG*-289 until he left the CoastGuard, receiving an honorable discharge; and

WHEREAS, during World War II, Harold joined the United States
Army's 5th Air Force, becoming a gunner with the 418th Night Fighter
Squadron; and

WHEREAS, on July 27, 1944, Harold's plane was shot down and crash-landed in New Guinea, but he and his crew of four survived the twenty-three days they were missing due to his knowledge of wilderness survival skills, and he was accordingly commended fordistinguished service; and

WHEREAS, on the completion of his military service, Harold returned to Connecticut and resided on the Tantaquidgeon family farm in Uncasville, next door to the Tantaquidgeon Museum, which Harold had founded in 1931 with his father, John, and his sister, Gladys; and

50 WHEREAS, Harold was a pillar of the Tantaquidgeon Museum,
51 lecturing on Native American lore and traditions and teaching survival
52 skills; and

53 WHEREAS, on April 4, 1989, Chief Harold Tantaquidgeon passed 54 away at the age of eighty-four; and

55 WHEREAS, the legacy of Chief Harold Tantaquidgeon is a source of 56 pride for Native Americans, veterans, members of the armed forces and 57 all citizens of the state of Connecticut.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Connecticut General
Assembly hereby recognizes the life and work of Chief Harold
Tantaquidgeon and may further recognize him by other appropriate
means; and

62 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Clerks of the House of 63 Representatives and the Senate cause a copy of this resolution to be 64 delivered to Chief Harold Tantaquidgeon's family as an expression of 65 the high esteem in which he is held.
