AN ACT MODIFYING THE REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ANALYSIS OF REGULATIONS AFFECTING SMALL BUSINESSES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

1 Section 1. Subsection (b) of section 4-168a of the general statutes is

repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective July 1*,
2025):

- (b) Prior to or concomitant with the posting of a notice pursuant to
 section 4-168, each agency shall prepare a regulatory flexibility analysis
 in which the agency shall identify:
- 7 (1) The scope and objectives of the proposed regulation;
- 8 (2) The types of businesses potentially affected by the proposed 9 regulation;
- 10 (3) The total number of small businesses potentially subject to the11 proposed regulation;

12 (4) Whether small businesses, in order to comply with the proposed 13 regulation, may be required to: (A) Create, file or issue additional

14 reports; (B) implement additional recordkeeping procedures, including, but not limited to, the retention of records for a period of time; (C) 15 16 provide additional administrative oversight; (D) hire additional 17 employees; (E) hire or contract with additional professionals, including, 18 but not limited to, lawyers, accountants, engineers, auditors or 19 inspectors; (F) purchase any product or make any capital investment; 20 (G) conduct additional training, audits or inspections; [or] (H) incur 21 costs or pay additional taxes or fees; (I) modify or provide an additional 22 employee benefit; (J) develop or modify an employee handbook; (K) 23 post a required notice; (L) modify a product manufactured by the small 24 business or the packaging of such product; or (M) develop or modify 25 operating procedures;

(5) Whether and to what extent the agency communicated with small
businesses or small business organizations in developing the proposed
regulation and the regulatory flexibility analysis, if applicable;

(6) Whether and to what extent the proposed regulation provides
alternative compliance methods for small businesses that will
accomplish the objectives of applicable statutes while minimizing
adverse impact on small businesses. Such methods shall be consistent
with public health, safety and welfare and may include, but not be
limited to:

(A) The establishment of less stringent compliance or reportingrequirements for small businesses;

(B) The establishment of less stringent schedules or deadlines forcompliance or reporting requirements for small businesses;

39 (C) The consolidation or simplification of compliance or reporting40 requirements for small businesses;

(D) The establishment of performance standards for small businesses
to replace design or operational standards required in the proposed
regulation; and

44 (E) The exemption of small businesses from all or any part of the

This act shall take effect as follows and shall amend the following sections:
