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### SPONSORS OF BILL:

Planning and Development

### REASONS FOR BILL:

The bill looks to authorize the municipalities of Bridgeport and Stratford, Connecticut, to waive mandatory interest penalties and return funds that accumulated from a neighboring housing cooperative's troubled budget.

Residents of both communities have begun requesting financial relief to help treat the debt repayment problem, and the call has been vast. The bill is expected to bring \$425,000 in relief to an approximately \$1 million share in debt.

### SUBSTITUTE LANGUAGE (IF APPLICABLE):

The substitute language allows any municipality to waive interest on delinquent property taxes, and return payments made towards such interest, for any common interest community containing more than 500 units that is in judicial receivership.

### RESPONSE FROM ADMINISTRATION/AGENCY:
