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SPONSORS OF BILL:

REASONS FOR BILL:

The bill seeks to rebalance the state's long-term care plan to offer more home-based and community living options. This transition is expected to honor Connecticut residents with disabilities and their need for additional care options, ensuring that long-term care can handle the state's growing needs, aging populations, and evolving care preferences.

RESPONSE FROM ADMINISTRATION/AGENCY:

[Connecticut Department of Social Services, Commissioner, Andrea Barton Reeves:](#)

Opposes SB 433, stating that rebalancing has been a focus of the Department for over a decade. Ms. Reeves adds that new language in Section 1(c)(2) of the bill is not necessary, considering the Department submitted the Operational protocol to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), said to inform strategic planning. She believes Section 2 of the bill is already best addressed by the Long Term Care Planning Committee.

[Connecticut Office of Policy and Management, Acting Secretary, Joshua Wojcik:](#)

Opposes the bill, however, understanding of the Committee's intent to expand home and community-based services. The Office shares three concerns for consideration: the proposed reporting deadline is not feasible or timely, further reporting is unnecessary since data is already available, and limiting work on the LTC Planning Committee, which is actively working on a development process.

[Commission on Women, Children, Seniors, Equity & Opportunity, Executive Director, Melvette Hill:](#)

Supports SB 433, stating that the demand for home and community-based long-term care (HCBS) is rising because of (1) increasing population shifts and (2) the preference over traditional institutional care. The Commission finds that the bill would allow more residents to choose where they age, respond to growing demands, and reduce financial burden on the state.

NATURE AND SOURCES OF SUPPORT:

[Connecticut Legal Services, Elder Law Attorney, Jean Mills Aranha:](#)

Calls the bill a “modest reach” that requires DSS to improve its outreach. Ms. Aranha notes how, for 25 years now, Connecticut has made strides in developing and implementing community long-term services. She is saddened to hear that the Governor’s budget doesn’t fund the Community First Choice benefit.

[American Civil Liberties Union of Connecticut, Policy Counsel, Jess Zaccagnino:](#)

Believing in a society where people with disabilities are free of discrimination, they are compelled to support the bill. Ms. Zaccagnino writes that SB 430 would enshrine the promise of the Americans with Disabilities Act into Connecticut state statute and provide enforcement mechanisms.

[Senate Democrats Office, Senate President Pro Tempore, Martin Looney:](#)

Mr. Looney believes that Connecticut residents deserve access to quality information about long-term care options. He shares that this would help individuals make better, more educated decisions and choices. As he says, Rebalancing Medicaid-funded long-term services “will allow elderly Medicaid recipients to select the living situation that is best for them.”

Welcomes the opportunity to support the study of expanding long-term service coverage.

[Connecticut Association for Healthcare at Home, President & CEO, Tracy Wodatch:](#)

Believes this proposal aligns with the Governor’s plan to sunset Community First Choice and transition Medicaid beneficiaries into more agency-based care. Ms. Wodatch suggests that any transition come with funding to support the capacity of agency-based providers.

[Disability Rights Connecticut, Litigation Attorney, Sheldon Toubman:](#)

Submits general comments on the work currently being undertaken by the LTC Planning Committee and DSS on maintaining Community First Choice. Mr. Toubman isn’t convinced that DSS will “balance” care with the community, given their disregard for its 2020 strategic LTC plan.

[Yale School of Public Health, Student, Qinyao Li:](#)

Confirms that Connecticut’s long-term services are undergoing serious demographic changes. As the number of residents with disabilities is expected to grow (+35,000 by 2028), Ms. Li finds the bill would strengthen efforts to expand access to HCBS and study additional strategies for expanding long-term care options.

[Sandra Roberts:](#)

Supports rebalancing the strategic plan and tasking the LTC Planning Committee to conduct a study on care options. Ms. Roberts says it would be a violation to eliminate the Community First Choice service.
