REASONS FOR BILL:

The bill proposes establishing a state-funded caregiver program for parents of children enrolled in a Medicaid waiver program. Testimony underscores the significant needs of these families, emphasizing how expanded caregiving support can help alleviate the challenges associated with raising children with autism spectrum disorder.

RESPONSE FROM ADMINISTRATION/AGENCY:

[Commission on Women, Children, Seniors, Equity & Opportunity, Executive Director, Melvette Hill:](#) Supports the bill because it allows necessary support for individuals on the autism spectrum and their caregivers. The Commission highlights that respite services can provide parents and caregivers with short periods of relief from the ongoing responsibilities of caregiving. They echo how support brought by the bill would enable those with autism spectrum disorder skills to learn, increase independence, and foster connections.

NATURE AND SOURCES OF SUPPORT:

Argues for the passing of SB 500, as it establishes a caregiver respite program to assist parents. CHA notes ASD affects approximately 1 in 31 children worldwide, stating that children/adolescents on the spectrum and families should have access to the right level of services.

Supports SB 500, considering families raising children with autism frequently face extraordinary caregiving responsibilities. The proposed program would help families obtain the assistance they need while allowing children with autism to remain safely supported in their homes and communities.

Opposes the bill and the creation of a “state-funded caregiver program that would compensate parents or provide expanded public funding for in-home care.” Mr. McWeeney adds that government programs are funded by people’s money, and that the appropriate response should focus on targeted services.
