Contribution to Result: The Arts Presentation Grant Program provides funding support to presenters for performances, workshops and residencies that engage artists and groups from CCT’s *Directories of Performing and Teaching Artists*. The program provides citizens access to a large variety of artistic and creative experiences, thereby generating more vibrant communities in which to live, learn, and work.

<p>that 68% of grantees are educational institutions; 11 % are units of local government such as libraries; and 21% are non profit organizations.</p> <p>Proposed actions to turn the curve: To increase greater awareness of the Arts Presentation grant program among units of local government, CCT will work with our local arts agencies, the CT Library Association, the CT State Library, the CT Parks & Recreation Association, etc. to publicize the program in their e-newsletters, on their websites and at their annual conferences. We will work with the CT Association of Nonprofits to publicize the program among non-profits.</p>	<p>Proposed action to turn the curve: CCT is unifying the Directory of Performing Artists and Directory of Teaching Artists in FY2011. The application and re-application process will take place in the winter of 2011. We expect that new artists from the various disciplines will apply. CCT will encourage artists from underserved disciplines (such as folklife and traditional artists) to apply. CCT is also unifying the two fee-support grant programs that will encourage presenters to bring new disciplines and new artists to their communities.</p>	<p>well and is anyone better off can only be gleaned anecdotally from the narrative section of the final reports.</p> <p>One indirect measure of customer satisfaction is the program's broad geographic reach and this is a report that our grants management database (PEARL) can provide.</p> <p>Proposed actions to turn the curve: To better collect information about how well and is anyone better off, CCT is in the process of redesigning a final report template applicable to all grant programs with a uniform set of qualitative and quantitative outcome measures that will get at customer/grantee satisfaction. Grantees will be asked to report specifically on the impact of the grant – what difference has it made – to individuals as well to their communities.</p>
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
