From 2006-2010*, \$98,497 in CCG Grant funds supported 58 Grantees, 37,819 student, youth, and adult learners, for an **average of \$2.60 per constituent**. Each state dollar spent leveraged a minimum equal dollar match by the private and public sector.

Story behind the baseline:

CCT used lessons learned from the successful approach developed through the teaching artist collaboration (TAC) component of CCT's Higher Order Thinking (HOT) Schools program as a model to build and expand statewide capacity to advance the arts as an essential element of schooling and lifelong learning.

Proposed actions to turn the curve:

CCT is unifying and redesigning two fee-support grant programs so that presenters can offer a continuum of services from arts performances, to curriculum connections, to authentic arts integration learning experiences through Creative Collaborations. The new program will encourage schools and organizations to determine the approach that is most beneficial to them, to think creatively about how they structure and deliver entry and advanced level arts learning opportunities to their customers.

Story behind the baseline:

Most CCG recipients are k-12 schools which is appropriate for arts in education programs. Students and communities benefit from strong school/community partnerships. CCGs encourage leveraging community resources with a highly qualified teaching artist as the liaison. We have not collected data in a usable format to identify which schools have partnered with an arts or community organization.

Proposed action to turn the curve: *Provide professional development for presenters*

Through professional development and technical assistance CCT will track session participation and resulting partnerships in education. Performance Measure 3: Creative Collaborations have a positive ripple effect on arts in education practices. Story behind the baseline: Projects/units developed as a result of CCGs take on a life of their own. Teaching artists use them as models in other schools and venues they work in, arts organizations end up with a new program offering for public consumption, and classroom teachers have a new way of engaging students. Proposed action to turn the curve: CCT is redesigning final reports. Collecting quantitative data that supports anecdotal comments and qualitative data that we currently receive will help to build and expand capacity to advance the arts as an essential element of schooling and lifelong learning statewide.
