• JRB Pilot Discussion:

- DCF tasked with creating a pilot consisting of statewide JRB objectives
 - Goal is to establish "core set of practices"
 - Connected with CYSA during development of pilot
- Currently working with seven different sites; specifically selected for variety
 - Waterbury
 - New Haven
 - Naugatuck
 - Bridgeport
 - Hartford
 - Norwich
 - Wethersfield
- Advisory group consisting of many different professionals within the field
- Pilot places an emphasis on parent and youth involvement
- Strong focus on following the restorative practices model within the JRB Pilot
- Implementation Phase: changes/amendments discussed will be put into practice
 - All seven sites will implement these changes
 - Data will be collected regarding the pilot's success
- Implementation is projected to begin by January/February 2023
 - Depends on funding; 6-month phase
- Community background and systems perspective is important due to variables due to city/town environment
- Concern of whether the pilot addresses racial and ethnic disparities
- Hope to focus on bridging harm reduction and recidivism together
- Focuses on RJ approach but also allows for focus on behavioral interventions
- Specific data that is being collected has not been determined yet
- Confusion of how CSD is obtaining individualized data
- Why aren't names being given to DCF?

- Conflict over confidentiality
- Schools differ from court systems
- Many researchers have been told they cannot release identifiable youth data
 - All data is deidentified; even for DCF
 - CSDE is the only agency to have identified data
- New project to put data into an online platform is in the works
- What is working and for whom?
 - Use a RED lens to examine this
- Issue of who is getting approved and sent to the JRB
 - Waterbury did away with misdemeanors being sent to JRB; causes issues for black and brown kids in the city

• Martha Stone – RED Work Overview:

- Waterbury is an outlier due to lack of cooperation from the police
- Waterbury sees a lot of juvenile arrests and cases in the juvenile court
- Identified 4 gaps in service:
 - Waitlist for MST & MDFT
 - Youth do not receive proper skill training for jobs
 - Chronic absenteeism services are not adequate
 - Lack of formal mediation & diversionary programs
- Identified 3 limitations on the data:
 - Lack of research on educational data for New Haven
 - Lack of recidivism date from the JRB
 - Crossover of youth with DCF and JJ system
- Mediation services exist in Bridgeport; not other cities
 - Private funding allows for these services to exist
- Discussion of seeking funding for mediation services from the OJJDP
- Concern about the lack of presence of New Haven district at the local RED meetings
