March 19, 2021

1) Identify short term/one-time needs that could funded through federal Coronavirus funding?

DDS Response:

While there have been and may continue to be extraordinary expenses related to the coronavirus, to date, the Office of Policy and Management has been very flexible and considerate when weighing the agency and our providers needs throughout the pandemic and providing resources to meet such needs.

As the recent relief bill is still being rolled out, there are potential additional resources that may become available both through an increased FMAP as well as specific relief funds. DDS will work within the agency and with our providers to identify gaps in needs and continue to work with OPM on meeting those needs with available resources.

Short term/one-time needs that may be funded through federal coronavirus funding may include:

- Day program environmental improvements
 - Ventilation
 - o Egresses
 - Dividers
 - Deep cleaning
 - o Additional staff provisions to decrease group sizes by half
- Residential supports
- Transportation to keep numbers on vans smaller

It is also important to note that the information requested for this question is only for the no service category of our waiting list. The Department's response does not include individuals who have some residential services but who need more, or a different type of, residential services (considered "underserved" as our part of our waiting list) or individuals who have "future needs" for residential services (meaning that the individual may want or need residential services within two (2) or more years).

4) Please provide detail on the housing initiatives in the pipeline, including how the agency will support the individuals and the number of people to be served.

DDS Response:

The IDASH notice of funding availability process yielded 3 awards to developers partnered with DDS providers to develop mixed-use affordable housing with a portion of the total units reserved for DDS supportive housing. The first project opened in Canton recently and serves 20 individuals. In the coming months the next IDASH project will open in Bloomfield serving 18 individuals. In late 2021 or early 2022 the final IDASH project will open in Hartford, serving 9 individuals.

There are an additional 2 supportive housing projects in the pipeline, both of which were awarded to developers via the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) process through the Department of Housing (DOH). These projects are similar to the IDASH developments and allow a DDS provider to partner with a developer who is submitting a request for LIHTC from DOH. These projects currently include a development in Torrington serving 12 individuals scheduled to open early 2022, and a Transit Oriented Design project in West Hartford serving 17 individuals scheduled to open in mid-2022.

All individuals will receive In Home Supports (IHS) with an emphasis on the use of Assistive Technology to enable self-sufficiency and safety for the residents who, as an example, will have video access to staff in addition to scheduled direct supports. These developments focus on social integration and enabling individuals to live full lives as community members.

All of the aforementioned projects have received project-based rental commitment from DDS and all residents will utilize Rental Assistance Program certificates, or RAPs, to help make the rent affordable. The funding source of the RAPs is the \$700,000 allocated for rental assistance DDS budget. Service funds are paid through a combination of new funds and both portable and recycled funds. Portable funds are funds already assigned to an individual who is moving to a new setting or support type and can bring their funding with them. Recycling involves using excess funds from portability or other sources to assign to individuals who have insufficient funds to participate.

There are 3 additional LIHTC projects proposed, but not yet awarded by DOH, and are anticipated to support 33 individuals, should all 3 be awarded.
