Unemployment

Updated unemployment rates in major cities.

The Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) contains unemployment rates for every city and town in Connecticut. This document is updated and posted on the Connecticut Department of Labor (CTDOL) website each month. For the September 2021 LAUS, please see Appendix 1. CTDOL does not define "major cities" for the purposes of unemployment rate, however the three towns with the largest labor force have unemployment rates as follows: Stamford – 5.2%, Bridgeport – 8.6%, and New Haven – 6.9%.

Jobs Growth

What are the number of new jobs registered? What is the economic sector breakdown?

CTDOL reports on total employment by sector each month, there is no "new jobs" registration mandate or system. We also receive information about job postings through <u>CTHires</u> and other <u>labor data</u>. The <u>Labor Situation</u> report is updated and published on our website each month, for the September 2021 report please see Appendix 2.

Reemployment

What is being done to match workers to jobs? What about the skills gap?

CTHires

CTDOL provides extensive information on reemployment to all registrants in CTHires (the state's job bank and case management system), which includes all UI filers, job seekers, and employers. CTHires provides:

- <u>Virtual Recruitment</u>—job postings sent directly to registrants that match registrant's skills, education/certifications, and interests. All CTHires job postings are vetted for legitimacy.
- <u>Employment Workshops</u> including resume writing, job search strategies, interviewing techniques, and navigating LinkedIn.
- <u>American Job Center</u> service notifications which alert registrants to programs and services available through the American Job Centers, connect them to information that may be beneficial to their job search, and provide direct links to appointment scheduling.

In addition, the five comprehensive American Job Centers (AJCs) use CTHires to assist job seekers by promoting:

- Local employer recruitments
- Career fairs
- Hot jobs lists indicating which employers are hiring
- Training opportunities that build skills, expand networks, and introduce new technology

CTHires collects occupational data that allows us to understand registrant's skill level and their industry sector. For a table of occupations for customers that have registered in CTHires since 1/1/2021, please see Appendix 3. This includes the raw number and the percentage of the total of all occupations. CTDOL also receives skills information through current job postings from Help Wanted On-Line (HWOL). This is a service we purchase through the Conference Board. The data comes from Burning Glass/Emsi. Please see Appendix 4 for HWOL information job postings and skills.

Reemployment Services and Eligibility Assessment

The Unemployment Insurance (UI) Reemployment Services and Eligibility Assessment (RESEA) program serves approximately 10,000 claimants per year by offering personalized assistance and case management. RESEA customers are generally those who are most likely to exhaust benefits and will be supported by a customized re-employment plan. If selected for RESEA, claimants will have individualized services available. If they choose not to participate, their benefits may be impacted.

Jobs First Employment Services

Connecticut's Jobs First Employment Services (JFES) program helps ~3500 parents per year gain the skills needed to obtain meaningful employment and become independent of cash assistance. CTDOL administers this program in partnership with the Department of Social Services (DSS) and the five Regional Workforce Development Boards (WDBs). JFES provides a host of employment services, such as job search assistance and skills training to time-limited recipients of Temporary Family Assistance (TFA), Connecticut's federally funded cash assistance program for low-income families. These families are referred to the JFES program by DSS. The WDBs operate as intermediaries that subcontract with other organizations to provide direct services to JFES participants in American Job Centers (AJCs) around the state.

Are the statistics capturing employees who are working from home? How many older workers are back to work?

State and federal surveys do not ask about or differentiate the work environment of employees. The monthly <u>Labor</u> <u>Situation</u> report is based on the submissions of employers who report the number of employees on their payrolls regardless of if they work from home or at a specific location.

The best source of employment by age is the Quarterly Workforce Indicators (QWI). These data are produced by the U.S. Census Bureau which matches CTDOL wage records to administrative data to provide demographic characteristics such as age. Processing this data is time intensive; the most recent data available are through the third quarter of 2020 and showed that quarterly average employment (not seasonally adjusted) was still falling. We will continue to study future releases of as new data becomes available. Through the 3rd quarter of 2020, total employment (all ages) fell 210,000 (13%) from 3rd quarter 2019. For those aged 55 to 64, employment fell 30,600 (9%) and for those aged 65 and above employment fell 16,400 (13%).

There is also employment data from the household survey also known as the Current Population Survey (CPS). The CPS has a small sample size in Connecticut (just a few hundred households each month) so the data are reported as a 12-month moving average. For the 12 months ended September 2021 compared to the 12 months ended March 2021 (months that saw the pandemic's highest impact) employment overall is up 15,200 (1%). Employment for those aged 55 to 64 is up 2,700 (1%) and for those aged 65 and over is up 1,400 (1%). Because the sources, concepts measured, and time periods are very different, the QWI and CPS data will never match. However, based on the limited data we have so far, older workers seem to be having similar labor market experiences as the population overall.

What is being done for outreach to the Hispanic community?

Our programs and services are universally available. We provide written and electronic documents in Spanish, including our CTHires system and we emergency-migrated several of our high-traffic web pages to the state's Sitecore web platform to ensure they are captured under the Google translator software that Connecticut uses. We expect our entire site to be migrated within a year. Additionally, we produce explainer videos and social media posts in multiple languages and American Sign Language and have done Spanish-language media in conjunction with English-language media.

LABOR FORCE CONCEPTS

The civilian labor force comprises all state residents age 16 years and older classified as employed or unemployed in accordance with criteria described below. Excluded are members of the military and persons in institutions (correctional and mental health, for example).

The employed are all persons who did any work as paid employees or in their own business during the survey week, or who have worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a family member. Persons temporarily absent from a job because of illness, bad weather, strike or for personal reasons are also counted as employed whether they were paid by their employer or were seeking other jobs.

The unemployed are all persons who did not work, but were available for work during the survey week (except for temporary illness) and made specific efforts to find a job in the prior four weeks. Persons waiting to be recalled to a job from which they had been laid off need not be looking for work to be classified as unemployed.

The unemployment rate represents the number unemployed as a percent of the civilian labor force.

With the exception of those persons temporarily absent from a job or waiting to be recalled to one, persons with no job and who are not actively looking for one are counted as "not in the labor force". Over the course of a year, the size of the labor force and the levels of employment undergo fluctuations due to such seasonal events as changes in weather, reduced or expanded production, harvests, major holidays and the opening and closing of schools. Because these seasonal events follow a regular pattern each year, their influence on statistical trends can be eliminated by adjusting the monthly statistics. Seasonal Adjustment makes it easier to observe cyclical and other nonseasonal developments.

Connecticut jobless rate falls as employment recovery continues (+4,700)

WETHERSFIELD, October 21, 2021 – Connecticut employment gains were estimated at 4,700 (0.3%) for September 2021 (seasonally adjusted). Connecticut nonfarm jobs are now 40,500 (2.6%) positions higher than the September 2020 job levels at 1,609,700. This is the ninth consecutive monthly gain in 2021. Connecticut has now recovered 70.4% (205,800) of the 292,400 positions lost in the March and April 2020 COVID lockdown period. August 2021 job gains were revised slightly lower by 300 to a 3,000 (0.2%) gain. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) produces these monthly statewide industry job estimates through the Current Employment Statistics (CES) program from a sample of businesses in the state.

"Connecticut gained jobs in September, building on the strong gains seen over the summer," said Patrick Flaherty, Director of the Office of Research at the Connecticut Department of Labor. "The unemployment rate has fallen in six of the last seven months, and September's decline came as the labor force expanded and the number of unemployed fell by more than 6,000."

Private sector employment improved by 4,900 jobs (0.4%) to 1,385,300 in September 2021 – now up 41,000 jobs (3.1%) from September 2020. The **government** *supersector* was just slightly lower by 200 jobs (-0.1%) in September to a level of 224,400. This is 500 (-0.2%) positions lower than September 2020. Year-ago federal government job levels were temporarily bolstered from the Census jobs at that time. The government *supersector* includes all federal, state, and local employment, including public education and Native American casino employment located on tribal reservation land.

Seven of the ten major industry *supersectors* produced employment gains while three decreased in September 2021.

In the Trade, Transportation & Utilities *supersector*, Wholesale Trade and Transportation & Warehousing added 1,900 and 1,300 jobs respectively. In Education & Health Services, Health Care & Social Assistance rose 900 with Educational Services up 200.

Connecticut Labor Market Areas (LMAs): Five out of the six Connecticut *LMAs,* that are seasonally adjusted by the BLS, had employment gains in September 2021, with just one regional labor market posting a small decline. The *Hartford LMA* (0.8%, 555,000) posted the largest monthly gain of 4,400. The *Norwich-New London-Westerly LMA* (2.9%, 119,000) was next, adding 3,300 jobs. The *Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk LMA* (0.5%, 377,900) added 2,000 positions, while the *New Haven LMA* (0.4%, 289,800) increased employment by 1,000. The *Danbury LMA* was also higher by 400 jobs (0.6%, 73,400). The *Waterbury LMA* declined slightly (-200, -0.3%, 65,600).

Note: The six major Connecticut LMAs are estimated independently from the statewide data by the BLS and cover more than 90% of the nonfarm employment in the state. Thus, estimates will not fully sum to the statewide total.

Hours and Earnings: The September 2021 **private sector** workweek, not seasonally adjusted, averaged 34.1 hours - this is unchanged from the September 2020 level (0.0%, 34.1). Average hourly earnings at \$33.93, not seasonally adjusted, were higher by just \$0.18 (0.05%) from the September 2020 estimate of \$33.75. The resultant September 2021 private sector weekly wage averaged \$1,157.01, up only \$6.13 from a year ago (0.05%). The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U, U.S. City Average, not seasonally adjusted) in September 2021 was up 5.4% from September 2020. *Current all-employee private sector hours and earnings estimates can be volatile due to fluctuating sample responses.*

Labor Force Data (residential household survey)

The September 2021 unemployment rate for Connecticut was estimated by the BLS Local Area Unemployment Statistics program (LAUS) to be **6.8%** (seasonally adjusted), down by 0.4 percentage point from the August 2021 level of 7.2%. The Connecticut unemployment rate was 8.3% in September 2020. The U.S. jobless rate in September 2021 was 4.8%, down four-tenths of a percentage point from the August 2021 rate of 5.2% and below the 7.8% year-ago U.S. unemployment rate.

Unemployment claims for first-time filers (seasonally adjusted) in Connecticut were an average of 3,730 per week in September 2021, down 969 (-20.6%) from the August 2021 (4,699) level and much lower by 3,678 claims (-49.6%) from the average weekly count of 7,408 in September 2020. This level of monthly average weekly initial claims is the lowest in the state since February 2020 (3,243), just before the COVID lockdown.

The nonfarm employment estimate, derived from a survey of businesses, is a measure of jobs in the state; the unemployment rate and labor force estimates are based on a household survey, and measure the work status of people who live in Connecticut. Overall, as the national and state economies recover, volatility in monthly numbers can be expected. Job and employment estimates are best understood in the context of their movement over several months rather than observed changes in a single month's value.
