Questions From Hearing

School participation in the Community Shares Program / How would additional \$500,000 be used?

The eGO CT Community Share (Pilot Program) is currently open to **170** school sites that use the Destiny catalog for books (a Baker & Taylor product). Our goal is to connect the remaining **765** school sites to the Connecticut State Library eBook collection. For an additional \$400,000 we could connect the remaining schools and provide ongoing access.

How else could an increase to the Statewide Digital Library allocation be used?

The State Library current provides statewide access to 38 databases, at a FY22 cost avoidance for libraries and schools of **\$41,480,364**. For **\$300,000**, the State Library could acquire 5 new databases:

1. <u>American Mosiac</u> from ABC-CLIO

Description: The American Mosaic series provides a platform for interdisciplinary research and learning in Ethnic Studies and American history. The rich cultural history of each group is illustrated through primary sources, scholarly articles, and media entries.

2. <u>Gale In Context: Opposing Viewpoints</u> – Gale

Description: Gale In Context: Opposing Viewpoints is the premier online resource covering today's hottest social issues, from capital punishment to immigration to marijuana. This cross-curricular resource supports science, social studies, current events, and language arts classes. Informed, differing views help learners develop critical-thinking skills and draw their own conclusions.

3. <u>Pronunciator</u>

Description: Pronunciator has a vast number of languages to learn (164), an unparalleled number of home languages (146), but also a peerless amount of instructional content available — an average of 10,000 instructional phrases per language. This is 20 times more content than the nearest competitor.

4. World Book Online

Description: World Book Online, from the publishers of the World Book Encyclopedia, provides access over 31,000 encyclopedia articles, 6,000 web links, 25,000 periodical articles, 800 animations and sounds, 400 interactive maps, 100 3-D bubble views, and much more.

5. <u>Bookflix</u> – Scholastic

Description: BookFlix[®] is a digital literacy resource that pairs more than 120 animated stories from Weston Woods with a best-selling nonfiction eBook from Scholastic on a similar subject. The fiction and nonfiction pairings are designed to strengthen early literacy skills while exposing young learners to real world concepts.

Does the UConn Library participate in the statewide delivery service?

UConn is not a regular participant, but does lend materials to research, public, and other libraries nationwide through other interlibrary loan services.

Recommendations for further CTLAB Support

CTLAB is part of a national network of libraries who serve blind and print disabled patrons, and it is operated in partnership with the Library of Congress, National Library Service. It is chiefly supported by federal funds (approximately \$150 million in direct and in-kind support each year, which provides all reading materials, direct-to-patron delivery, equipment, and related items). Connecticut supports some CTLAB personnel, provides the operations center, and other small incidentals. \$100,000 was first appropriated to directly support CTLAB services in FY23. This funding has allowed us to acquire assistive technology devices and equipment, stand up hub library locations, increase outreach initiatives, and similar purchases. In future, this funding will continue to fund these efforts, as well as fund training opportunities for CTLAB staff related to their duties and to better serve CTLAB patrons. The State Library is currently developing ways to support training opportunities for library and museum staff in Connecticut so they can better serve individuals who are blind or print disabled, and additional funds could go to support this initiative.

- 1. Is there anything you would change about this budget? The State Library's budget has been reduced 32% over the past 12+ years. This has impacted general operations, acquisitions particularly in the area of law and legislative materials, incentive grants to public libraries, Borrowlt reimbursements, and more. In addition, library materials costs increase every year, even to maintain the same content, so a flat budget allocation is a functional cut for us. As the State Archives, Public Records Administrator, principal law library, and the repository of state history, we are an agency that provides widespread support to all three branches of government. Our current budget continues to be insufficient to adequately meet our many statutory mandates.
- 2. Is there anything you would add to this budget? See above. With additional funds, we could restore key resources, better support public libraries and other agencies, and innovate rather than focus on minimal maintenance efforts.
