Advancing CT Together	Hartford	Addresses community connectedness and mental well-being in Hartford by providing free yoga classes, mindfulness workshops, and conflict resolution training for Hartford residents
Brother Carl Hardrick Institute	Hartford	Youth Empowerment Program will support high school students in Hartford with school-based mentoring, positive youth development programming, and by building relationships with students' families
