## Testimony of Judge Patrick L. Carroll III Chief Court Administrator for the Judicial Branch Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee General Bonding Subcommittee Agency Presentation March 14, 2019

Good afternoon Senator Moore, Representative Miller, Senator Witkos, Representative Floren and members of the Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee General Bonding Subcommittee. My name is Patrick L. Carroll, III, and I am the Chief Court Administrator for the Judicial Branch. I am honored to come before you today as I have for the past six years to provide an overview of the Judicial Branch's capital projects.

Before I do so, I must note that there is an error in Governor Lamont's proposed capital fund budget. For the Judicial Branch's FY 2021 request for *Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Improvements and Code Compliance to Courthouses Statewide*, the Judicial Branch requested \$5 million. The Governor's proposed capital fund budget incorrectly shows that the Judicial Branch requested \$2 million; not the \$5 million request that the Judicial Branch submitted. The Office of Policy and Management (OPM) has confirmed that it is an error, and that the Judicial Branch's request was in fact \$5 million and not the \$2 million shown in the Governor's proposed capital fund budget.

I request that you consider our ADA project as I requested and reported to OPM – \$5 million for FY 2021.

## **Judicial Branch Locations**

The Judicial Branch's building inventory includes a mix of older and newer buildings, in various levels of condition, construction and adaptability. The Judicial Branch operates 88 owned and leased locations (39 owned/49 leased) in 25 cities and towns. Our more than 40 courthouses range in age from the historic New London courthouse built in 1784 to our newest location in Torrington that was completed in 2017. The largest courthouse is in Stamford, commanding 251,000 square feet, and our smallest is Rockville Juvenile Court, a modest 9,072 square feet.

## Judicial Branch Capital Funding Priorities

The Judicial Branch's biennium capital budget request is \$19,250,000 for FY 2020 and \$19,000,000 (as requested) for FY 2021. These funds will allow the Judicial Branch to make critical improvements in the following areas:

- 1. Infrastructure repairs to courthouses statewide;
- 2. Security improvements;
- 3. ADA improvements and code compliance to courthouses statewide;
- 4. Technology strategic plan improvements;
- 5. Stamford Courthouse HVAC upgrades.

The availability of bond funds allows us to keep the court system up and running in a safe and accessible manner. Two recent examples will illustrate the importance of bond funding to our daily operations:

- The Judicial Branch owns and operates 231 Capitol Avenue. This building was constructed in 1909 and houses not only the Connecticut Supreme Court, but also the Connecticut State Library and Museum. This past weekend, during a scheduled testing of the antiquated fire alarm system, the fire panel failed. Interim measures including a fire watch protocol are now in place and will remain so until the panel is replaced. The replacement cost is yet to be determined and is expected to exceed half a million dollars, at minimum.
- Construction is underway for Phase 1 of the ADA Juror Accessibility Project, which will upgrade existing lavatories in six courthouses' jury assembly areas to meet ADA code. This work is expected to be completed by the fall. The next phase of the project, dependent on available bonding funding, is jury assembly lavatory upgrades in the remaining 12 courthouses and modification or replacement of courtroom jury boxes.

The Judicial Branch relies on bond funds to provide and maintain safe and secure buildings to serve judges, staff, attorneys, litigants and the public. We appreciate the support of the Legislature in meeting Judicial Branch capital funding needs.
