It was framed and put up in the Academy's Home. Thousands went to the Academy to see the dreadful scroll called the Bonaparte Autograph. This occurence is about the beginning among us of the Autograph Mania.

TITUS HOSMER.

Titus Hosmer was born in Watertown, Connecticut, in 1736. His grandfather had been an officer in Cromwells army and upon the restoration had emigrated to Boston and afterwards to Connecticut. Titus Hosmer graduated at Yale in the class of 1757 and

afterwards began the practice of law in his native town. From 1773 to 1778 Mr. Hosmer was a member of the Connecticut assembly over which he presided as speaker in 1777. He served in the continental congress in 1778 and 1779 and in the following year became judge of the maritime court of appeals in the United States. Hosmer was closely intimate with the poet, Joel Barlow, and the latter wrote a touching eulogy upon Hosmer's death.

Titus Hosmer died in Watertown, Conn., August 4th, 1780.
