Written Testimony Regarding LCO No. 3471, An Act Concerning Police Accountability

Senator Winfield, Representative Stafstrom, Ranking Members Kissel and Rebi mbas, and members of the Judiciary Committee

My name is Jocelyn Phung, and I am a resident of Milford, CT. I am te stifying regarding LCO No. 3471, An Act Concerning Police Accountability. I support some sections of LCO No. 3471 that increase police accountability; it is essential that police officers are held accountable for racial profil ing, brutalizing and murdering civilians. However, more effective measures need to be put in place to ensure police accountability and police divestme nt, especially for the Black and Latinx community in CT. It is important to not only hold the police accountable, but also to reinvest in our communiti es by redistributing police funding to education, physical and mental healt h care, affordable housing, social services and public goods. This bill is a great start, but I cannot fully support it without further amendments. Th is bill is simply not enough.

The language in Sections 1-4 & 15 suggest that the police has the aut hority to police themselves for the certification and decertification proce ss. This is harmful and would facilitate corruption and a lack of accountab ility. The language in these section should be amended to create an indepen dent investigation body, who do not have a conflict of interest, to be in c harge of these matters.

Sections 33-35 proposes for a new inspector general position to inves tigate the use of force and DOC custodial deaths. An independent prosecutor is necessary for police accountability. In addition, there is substantial r esearch and evidence demonstrating that implicit bias training does not red uce police brutality or effectively change police behavior. Mandatory impli cit training would be a waste of resources, and therefore should not be inc luded in this bill.

Section 18 suggests that police departments evaluate the effectivenes s of social workers and whether or not police officers' work should be rep laced by social workers. Since police departments have a conflict of intere st, it is important to have an independent body, without a conflict of inte rest, in charge of evaluating this.

In general, body-worn cameras do not, and cannot reduce police violen ce and brutality or increase accountability *unless* they are accompanied by policies that prioritizes police accountability. In the absence of proper, adequate policies, police reforms do not result in safer communities, but r ather increased, unnecessary surveillance.

Lastly, I would like to voice my support for Sections 8, 9, 17, 30, 4 0 & 41, which are great steps towards police accountability. Police violenc e specifically towards Black and Latinx people is a serious problem in Conn ecticut. Proper policies need to be put in place to stop the cycle of polic e brutality.
