I wish to voice my opposition to this bill. I have followed the improvements that law enforcement has made over the past fifty years. I would say that many were initiated by pressure from the public, legislative actions and others initiated by law enforcement. Prior to the 19070's was little control on physical abuse by police, in the 80's and 90's additional controls were enacted that began to address the use of force issues via better training, supervision and recruitment. In the 2000's we have seen improved minority hiring, better administrative control with the use of civilian review boards and administrative controls. We also saw the use of cameras in police vehicle and most recently body cameras. Certainly, these changes were supported by citizens and law enforcement officials and demonstrates a true concerns from all sides to improve this essential service.
