I would like to add the following for your review.

I have some idea of how police deal with society as my brother was a police officer for over 30 years here in Ct and my cousin in Vermont for about the same 30 years. I am appalled at the disgraceful and dangerous behavior being forced upon our police officers in this country. The statistics do not back up what protestors and rioters are doing to our major cities, police, and the inhabitants of these towns and cities. Most all if not all the most recent incidents that have let to riots have started with resisting arrest or some other violence directed at police officers responding – and a corrupt mainstream media.

If we as a society destroy the ability of our police to defend the innocent people and uphold the law we will degrade into a lawless brutal society ruled by gangs and thugs – like we saw in the "great" nation of CHAZ and many other places around the world.

I would also like to add this. I spent 31 years working in NYC from 1978 until 2010. It was a very dangerous place in the 70's and 80's.
