## **Brief History**

- Commission on Compensation of Elected State Officers and Judges
  - Made recommendations to Legislature
- PA 12-93 (Codified at CGS § 51-47c)
  - Created the 12-member Commission on Judicial Compensation



#### **Commission Members**

- Appointments
  - four by the governor
  - one each by the six legislative leaders
  - two by the Supreme Court chief justice
- To the extent practicable, appointed members should have experience in financial management, human resources administration, or determining executive compensation

#### Overview of CGS § 51–47c

- By January 2, 2013 and every four years thereafter, requires the commission to:
  - examine the adequacy of and need to adjust the compensation for certain judicial officials for the following four fiscal years;
  - 2. make compensation recommendations; and
  - 3. report its findings to the governor, Office of Policy and Management secretary, legislature, chief justice, and chief court administrator

### **Judicial Officials**

- Commission must make compensation recommendations for the following judicial officials:
  - Supreme Court chief justice and associate justices
  - Appellate Court chief judge and judges
  - Superior Court judges
  - chief court administrator, if a judge or justice
  - deputy chief court administrator, if a judge
  - appellate, judicial district, and chief administrative judges;
  - senior judges and judge trial referees, chief family support magistrate, family support magistrates, and family support referees

#### Factors to Consider in Making Recommendations

- Law requires the commission to consider all appropriate factors when making compensation recommendations
- Seven specific factors to consider:
  - 1. state's overall economic climate;
  - 2. inflation rate;

- 3. compensation for federal and other states' judges;
- 4. compensation for attorneys employed by government agencies, academic institutions, and private and nonprofit organizations;
- 5. state's interest in attracting highly qualified and experienced attorneys to serve in judicial capacities;
- 6. compensation adjustments for state employees during the applicable fiscal years
- 7. state's ability to fund compensation increases
