Accessibility to Information Regarding Group Homes

Proposal to Empanel a Blue Ribbon Commission to Review the Awarding of Contracts, Management Of, and More relating to Group Homes

The growth in the public-private partnership between the State of Connecticut and nonprofit, private sector contractors continues to grow. Millions of taxpayer dollars fund these contracts where transparency has been an issue.

In November, 2006, the Courts supported the release of information sought by you relating to HMO's managing the State's Husky Program. The decision stipulated "as state contractors they perform a governmental function". The decision was also bailed by many who seek to expand government's transparency with private contractors. Connecticut Legal Services said the decision sends a clear message that "public contractors are accountable for the millions of tax dollars paid to them each year."

With the understanding that you initiated the release of the information on the HMOs, I am

asking that you immediately intercede to keep that momentum of transparency growing.

Groups Homes are rapidly surfacing in neighborhoods throughout Connecticut. The majority of Group Homes are allowed to bypass local zoning laws and are managed by non-profit, private sector businesses at the cost of millions of dollars to taxpayers with little to no public oversight.

It was recently reported that the Department of Children and Families agreed to a \$10 million federal class action lawsuit wherein "DCF has agreed to complete 43 new special therapeutic group homes to serve 173 mentally ill youths."

In addition to Group Homes in Connecticut serving trouble youths they also house drug addicts, alcoholics, sex offenders and/or those released from the prison system. Controversy has surrounded some of the existing group homes from the awarding of contracts to incidents reported by the press.

One group home was anticipated to be purchased for \$1 million to house 6 teenage girls prior to the release of a report by the State auditors containing the following excerpt:

We believe this cannot be considered a fair, open and competitive process because it was tainted by the premature discussions that took place between a representative of the Children's Trust Fund and the winning not-for-profit agency. Also, we believe that the winning not-for-profit should not have received the award because it did not submit a complete application by the deadline specified in the RFP. Further, we believe the many other questions raised above should be addressed in any future RFP evaluations.

The Journal Inquirer newspaper recently reported on a 25 year old autistic man from East Hartford who drowned in a pond at Elizabeth Park. The drowning victim was a resident of an East Hartford group home run by the non-profit Community Residences Inc. of Southington. Journal Inquirer - Autistic EH man drowns in WH park pond, investigation under way

Where you were successful in generating the release of information on HMOs, residents abutting group homes have not been as successful.

Attempts by Arlene Lucien of Waterbury to have your agency, Department of Children and Families, release information on the number of and dates of incident reports at a group home in her area resulted in the following response:

Ms. Lucien- as was stated in the phone message I left for you today, the incident reports with just dates are also not disclosable via CGS 17a-28. Thanks Lisa Flower

Again, please note that Ms. Lucien was simply seeking the release of the number of incidents and the dates of those incidents at a particular group home. She never asked for nor expected to receive the names of those involved or even a detailed explanation of the incident. If the information cannot be disclosed to Ms. Lucien, then it would appear that it would not be accessible to you as well if we rely upon the aforementioned by Ms. Lisa Flower.

Request for Opinion by Attorney General Blumenthal

I am asking that you seek an opinion on the interpretation of CGS 17a-28 by Attorney General Blumenthal to determine if he supports Ms. Flower's findings. If Ms. Lucien or you, as the Governor, could not gain insight into a simple, non invasive question relating simply to the number of incident reports filed and the dates of those reports on one group home, then I question how you as the Governor can monitor these private sector facilities.

Empanel Blue Ribbon Commission

I further suggest that you empanel a Blue Ribbon Commission to review and improve the process of

- contracting to purchase group homes,
- contracting to manage group homes,
- providing management and financial oversight of group homes for the benefit of the taxpayers, the public living in close proximity to the group homes and those inhabiting group homes.
- public notification of the establishment of group homes in neighborhoods to include the name of the contact person responsible for oversight of the group home,
- greater public disclosure of noninvasive information such as the number of incident reports stemming from group homes as recently sought, etc,

I further suggest that a website be provided which clearly defines the costs associated with each group home as well as full disclosure of all principals and investors of LLCs which have been awarded contracts to manage group homes and will reap the financial benefits of State contract awards.

April 18, 2007 Governor Jodi Rell,

I write to you today, with great concern as a taxpayer. It is most difficult to express the level of frustration encumbered by a negligent legislature. At topic is an ill attempt by my State Representative, Selim Noujaim to address numerous issues with State law adversely affecting taxpayers in regard to group home usage by various State agencies. A Bill put forward by Selim , 6916, which was in total content with one exception, a draft of a questioneer that I posed to the Waterbury delegation, "died" in committee as Andy Woodcock, legislative aide to Senator Handley, Chair of Public Health Committee reported

As a wife of 29 years, and mother of three daughters; two in college, one in high school, I attest that neglect of one or more family members concerns, by individual or multiple members destroys its unity, affecting all. As is the case with government.

I'll attempt now, to focus for you, the compounded & unjust burdens to taxpayers which are being ignored by the State, in relation to the scheme of contracting non-profit vendors to operate residential group homes by various State agencies to administer State funded programs under current State law. To begin, one State practice afflicting taxpayers, is that the funded purchase costs of properties rarely are below, or at the median household income level. Generally, funding well exceeds that. With the turbulent economic struggle taxpayers face daily to sustain their property rights, it is ludicrous that the State assumes that taxpayers should support that which they, themselves, could not afford.

Adding insult to injury, the State does not confirm group home vendors as quasi-public agencies, though they obtain over a billion dollars of contracts annually. The vast majority of State contracted non-profit vendors have operating costs which are 75% or more State funded. They should be confirmed by law as quasi-public agencies under Freedom of Information laws.

The State does not govern construction & renovation bids. It should. The State does not have a public master registry to support compliance with statutes 8-3f (1,000 ft buffer zones), and 19a-507b (municipal percentage scales). It should. The State does not require re-licensing inspections of vendors which should be held annually by an outside review panel separate from the program agency. It should. Residents should not need to get approval from their local governmental boards to petition for license revoking, nor the programs Commissioner. There should be an outside State office to administer & review petitions.

I pray that I will receive your response soon, with intent to delegate reviews or changes to the facts I have presented to you.
