My name is Andrew and I am 12 years old. I am currently in 6th grade. I like going to school because it provides me with challenges. Without those challenges, I would not be able to learn. I get to see my friends that I enjoy spending time with. I ran cross country and I enjoyed a STEM coding club this year.

If you take away the religious exemption to vaccines, I will not be able to go to school. I am not vaccinated and my family has religious objections to vaccines. I consider myself extremely healthy. I have learned that I can keep myself healthy by eating right and staying active. In my school, most of the kids are vaccinated. I am in the minority as an unvaccinated kid. This year, over 30 kids in my school had the flu at the same time. However, I have never had the flu but have watched other kids around me continue to get sick with the flu, asthma, and allergies. I have no allergies and the worst illness I've ever had is the common cold.
