CONVERSION TABLES USER'S GUIDE

The Public Acts to General Statutes Conversion Tables show the disposition made of each section of the Revision of 1949 and each section of the 1955 and November, 1955, Supplements to the General Statutes, and the statute section numbers or other classification of the Public Acts passed at the regular and special sessions of the General Assembly held from 1957 to the present. There is also a table showing certain Special Acts that have been codified into the General Statutes.

Where any Public Act provisions have not been codified and are therefore omitted from the General Statutes, the reason is indicated in a general way as follows:

Approp. signifies an appropriation section.

C. signifies a corrective section.

C.A. signifies a constitutional amendment.

Eff. signifies a provision that determines when a law shall take or be in effect.

O. signifies "obsolete", in which term is included not merely those laws which by their terms have ceased to be operative, but also those which in fact, for any reason, have ceased to be effective or necessary.

Rd. signifies that a law has been repealed by express provision.

Rg. signifies a repealing provision.

Rnbd. signifies that a new section, first published in a supplement, was renumbered prior to being published in the General Statutes.

R.I. signifies that a law is repealed by implication.

S. signifies that a law is special in nature, but remains in full force and effect according to its terms.

Un. signifies that a section is unnecessary because it duplicates an existing section.

V. signifies a validating provision.

Vetoed signifies that a Public Act was vetoed by the Governor and not repassed by the General Assembly.

Void signifies that a section did not become law.
