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INTRODUCTION

This publication is intended to serve as a reference source for legislators and administrative officials of the executive branch in matters relating to the state budget. It includes all appropriations, bond authorizations and revenue estimates which make up the budget for the 1972-73 fiscal year. A discussion of budget items affected by 1972 legislation is provided in each section.

The state budget for 1972-73 includes several significant changes. The major changes affecting revenue are an increase in the sales tax rate from $6\frac{1}{2}\%$ to 7%, effective July 1, 1972, and a reduction in the monthly sales tax exemption on utility bills from \$20 to \$10. On the expenditure side there is \$25 million included in the Debt Service appropriation to begin payment on the \$244 million general fund deficit. Also included in the Debt Service appropriation is \$9 million for payment of interest on the deficit. Other new and expanded programs funded in the Appropriation Act are listed in the Appropriations section of the book.

Legislation incorporated in the Appropriation Act provides for payment of the deficit over a ten year period in substantially equal annual amounts. The Act also provides that any surplus in the general fund would be used to reduce that portion of the Debt Service appropriation required for meeting the annual payments of principal and interest on the deficit. Any surplus in excess of the Debt Service requirements for funding the deficit would be carried over to reduce the Debt Service requirements for funding the deficit in subsequent years.

A summary of the state budget by fund appears on page iv. The revenue estimates are those presented with the legislation at the time of passage.

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APPROPRIATIONS 1972-73

The 1972 Legislature authorized appropriations for 1972-73 fiscal year totaling \$1.3 billion. Most of these funds were provided for in the Appropriation Act, Special Act 53 of the 1972 regular session. The appropriations authorized in the Act are broken down by fund as follows.

The net General Fund amount shown above includes a turnover factor of \$4.2 million. This indicates the expected amount of unexpended appropriations on June 30, 1973. Actual gross General Fund appropriations in the Act totaled \$1,170,279,233.

A summary of the Appropriation Act by fund and by character and major object appears on the next page. This is followed by the Appropriation Act. The account number provided in the left-hand column specifies the Comptroller's accounting code for the appropriation.

In addition to the Appropriation Act there was one public act (PA 138) authorizing a supplementary General Fund appropriation of \$121,000 to the Public Utilities Commission; see page 35.

### PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION

PA 138

38 Sub SB 50 - AN ACT CONCERNING AN ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION AND INCREASING THE ASSESSMENTS AGAINST PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANIES - provides for an additional General Fund appropriation of \$121,000 to the Public Utilities Commission. These funds will be used for six additional engineers and four accountants to handle increasing workloads in investigations of utility rate and service cases before the Commission. The bill also increases the percentage of Commission expenses to be assessed among the public service companies from fifty to fifty-six per cent in order to offset the additional appropriation.

### SUMMARY OF NEW AND EXPANDED PROGRAMS AUTHORIZED IN THE 1972-73 APPROPRIATIONS ACT

This summary identifies the new and expanded programs authorized in the 1972-73 Appropriations Act, and the amount of additional funds provided for each.

# SUMMARY OF BOND AUTHORIZATIONS FOR 1972-1973

Bond authorizations passed by the 1972 Legislature totaled \$256,765,000, which brings the amount of bonds authorized and unissued to \$1,445,205,000 as of June 30, 1972. Of the total passed in 1972, \$63,640,000 is designated for capital construction and improvement projects. Another \$158,125,000 is authorized for continuing statutory programs, including funding of grants for local school building projects (\$77,125,000) and the water pollution control program (\$75,000,000). An authorization of \$10,000,000 is made to begin operation of the Connecticut Product Development Corporation, to encourage the expansion of job opportunities through development, manufacture, and marketing of new products. In the Treasurer's office, \$25,000,000 is provided to fund the secondary market for student loans, to encourage lending institutions to offer loans under this program.

The following listing includes all bonding authorized in 1972, organized by function of governemnt. Items are contained in SA 31, the omnibus bond act, unless otherwise noted. At the end of the section, the other acts affecting bond authorizations are cited; these either make technical changes or provide for transfer of funds between previously approved projects.

### SUMMARY OF REVENUE 1972 - 1973

The major change in revenue measures during the 1972 session was the increase in the sales tax rate from 6.5% to 7% and the reduction in the monthly exemption on utility billings from \$20 to \$10. These increases were made to begin financing payment on the deficit. Most other changes in revenue measures came in the general fund, with only an exemption allowance under the gasoline tax for the state affecting both the general fund and the highway fund.

Other taxes modified by the major revenue act are the corporation business tax as it affects banks and insurance company taxes, with rates for the latter being lowered in fiscal 1974. Revenue measures altered by other legislation include the capital gains and dividends minimum tax, cabaret tax and professional license fees. Each revenue item changed by the 1972 legislature is summarized beginning on page 58, with a notation concerning the estimated amount of revenue gain or loss.

On the following pages are revenue schedules for all appropriated state funds. Estimates are those which were associated with the appropriate legislation at the time of passage. These are the same figures that are presented in the <u>Governor's Budget Report, 1972-1973</u>, with two exceptions in the general fund. The transfer from the Commission on Special Revenue (lottery) was raised from \$14 million to \$20.5 million because of experience in actual lottery ticket sales to date. Second, items were reallocated among several categories under other revenue: licenses, permits, and fees; sales of commodities and services; miscellaneous; and transfer from other funds.

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### SUMMARY OF REVENUE MEASURES AFFECTED BY 1972 LEGISLATION

SALES AND USE TAX

<u>RATE</u> The rate of the sales and use tax is increased from 6.5% to 7%, effective July 1, 1972 (PA 285).

### Revenue increase: \$30,300,000

EXEMPTIONS Monthly exemption on utility billings is reduced from \$20 to \$10, with the change taking effect for billing periods commencing on and after July 1, 1972 (PA 285). The exemption of meals served in educational institutions is extended to include meals served patients in hospitals, homes for the aged, convalescent homes and nursing homes (PA 46).

Revenue increase Reduction in utility exemption \$20,600,000 Revenue decrease Extension of meals exemption 15,000

<u>OTHER PROVISIONS</u> Two provisions under the sales tax are removed. The section of the statutes which provides for an appropriation to the State Development Commission of 8% of the gross revenue from the sales tax collections on transfers of occupancy of hotel and lodging house rooms is eliminated. The revenue was earmarked for promotion and development of the recreation industry in Connecticut. Funds for this purpose are provided, instead, in the appropriations act. Also deleted is the requirement that a contract be entered into sixty days prior to an increase in rate for the new rate not to apply, as long as delivery is made within ninety days after the increase (PA 285).

### CAPITAL GAINS AND DIVIDENDS TAX

MINIMUM TAX The minimum tax of five dollars (the amount of tax due even if less than five dollars were owed) is eliminated. There is further provision that any resident whose gross income from capital gains and dividends is one hundred dollars or less in any taxable year is not subject to the tax and is not required to file a return for that year. The changes are applicable to taxable years commencing after December 31, 1970 (PA 2).

Revenue effect - no change in fiscal 1973

EXCLUSION Any dividends received by individuals from a qualified Domestic International Sales Corporation (DISC) are excluded from taxation (PA 271). For further treatment of DISC's, see the exemption section under the corporation business tax. No revenue amount can be measured, since no DISC's are now doing business in the state.

### CORPORATION BUSINESS TAX

<u>RATE</u> The rate of the tax is made permanent at 8% of net income. The capital base tax is continued at 4 mills or \$45, whichever is greater. The comparable tax on banking institutions continues at 3.2%. All of these rates were due to revert to pre-1969 levels on January 1, 1973 (PA 285).

Revenue effect - no change in fiscal 1973

MINIMUM TAX BASE The amount which certain investment funds owe on the minimum tax base of the corporation tax is limited by formula, for income years beginning on or after January 1, 1972 (PA 126). This treatment affects funds such as real estate investment trusts and mutual funds, which have not to date found it competitively possible to locate in the state because of tax provisions.

EXEMPTION Any export corporation operating in the state through a qualified Domestic International Sales Corporation (DISC) is exempt from taxation under the corporation tax (PA 271). The act makes treatment of such corporations compatible with the tax incentive given them under the Federal Revenue Act of 1971, under which the profits of a DISC are not taxed to the DISC, but to its shareholders. A revenue effect is not determinable, since no DISC is currently located in the state.

<u>BANKS</u> The schedule for increasing the percent of interest expense which a bank may deduct in arriving at net income is restored, beginning in 1973. This percentage was frozen at 60% in 1971 legislation. For the income year beginning in 1972, 60% deduction is allowed and the percentages increase as follows:

### INSURANCE TAXES

PREMIUMS TAX The rates on domestic and foreign companies are equalized at 2%, as indicated below:

The change with respect to domestic insurance companies takes effect July 1, 1973. The increase for foreign companies is effective January 1, 1973 (PA 285).

INTEREST AND DIVIDENDS The rate of the interest and dividend tax on domestic companies is lowered from 3.5% to 2.625%, effective July 1, 1973 (PA 285).

Revenue effect - no change in fiscal 1973

<u>SELF-INSURED BENEFIT PLANS</u> Any employee welfare benefit plan established before January 1, 1972, which is exempt from taxation under federal income tax is exempt from the tax on self-insurers (PA 267). The exemption applies to all organizations listed under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code, except for certain mutual insurance companies or associations. Included in the list are union welfare funds. Although \$42,000 has been collected from the tax in the first eleven months of fiscal 1972, no revenue is anticipated in 1973, due to the exemption outlined above and difficulties in collecting the tax.

ADMISSIONS, DUES, CABARET TAX

<u>CABARET TAX</u> Application of the tax is limited so that it is not imposed in places providing the music of a single instrumental performer alone (PA 88).

Revenue decrease - \$85,000

GASOLINE TAX

The state of Connecticut is exempted from payment of the motor fuel tax (PA 205), eight cents of which goes to the highway fund and two cents to the general fund. Net effect of the exemption is a revenue loss to both funds, with an equal saving in agency expenditures.

Revenue decrease Highway fund - \$800,000 General fund - 200,000

#### PROFESSIONAL LICENSE FEES

A number of changes are made in the licensing fees and all renewals are placed on an annual basis. The charge as it affects attorneys is termed a "tax" and made payable to the tax department, with enforcement provisions added. The changes are effective July 1, 1972. See schedule on the following pages for all changes in fees (PA 223).

#### PENSIONS

Legislators The bill provides for a voluntary pension plan for which legislators are eligible after ten years of service. Contribution is ten percent of annual compensation. The annual pension for normal retirement (after age 65) is two and one-half percent of average annual compensation during the last six years of credited future service¹ or during all years of credited future service if there are less than six, multiplied by the number of years of credited future service, plus fifty dollars for each year of credited past service². The pension for early retirement (after age 55) is the same as above, except that the amount is reduced by six-tenths of one percent for each full month that retirement comes before the 65th birthday. There is a maximum pension of seventy-five percent of average annual compensation received during the last six years of credited future service.

¹Credited future service indicates years accumulated after January 3, 1973.

²Credited past services is available only to those who were members during the 1972 regular session of the General Assembly.
