Analysis and Summary of Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program FFY 18 Allocation Plan

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Introduction

The Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) is administered by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The primary objective of the program is to develop viable communities by providing support for decent housing and a suitable living environment, principally for persons of low-and moderate-income.

At the state level, the Department of Housing (DOH) will administer the funds provided through the Small Cities CDBG Program.

Federal Allocation Process

The Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (HCD Act), as amended in 1981, allows each state the opportunity to administer CDBG funds for non-entitlement areas. Non-entitlement areas include those units of general local government which do not receive CDBG funds directly from HUD as part of the entitlement program (Entitlement Cities and Urban Counties). Funds are allocated to states based on a formula, which takes into account population, poverty, incidence of overcrowded housing, age of housing, and growth lag factors. Connecticut's federal fiscal year (FFY) 18 allocation has not yet been published by HUD but is estimated at \$12,105,315. FFY 16 – FFY 18 allocations are identified in the table below:

State Allocation Process

DOH will administer the program through a competitive application process for most activities.¹ Eligible activities include: housing, public services, public facilities, economic development, and planning. Additional allocation requirements include:

- 1. Funds must be expended in any municipality except Connecticut's 22 entitlement cities, which are those which receive CDBG funds directly from HUD (see Appendix A);
- 2. At least 70% of funds must be used for activities that benefit low-and moderateincome persons, over one, two, or three consecutive program years;
- 3. Funds must support at least one of the following three major program categories:
 - (1) Benefit low and moderate-income families,
 - (2) Prevent or eliminate slums or blight, and
 - (3) Meet other urgent community development needs.

Connecticut's project allocation is fully dedicated to benefiting low and moderate- income families;

- 4. Grant funds can support administrative costs up to \$100,000, plus 50% of costs in excess of \$100,000, up to 3% of the annual grant (inclusive of the 1% for Technical Assistance); and
- 5. Planning and administration expenditures cannot exceed 20% of the Small Cities CDBG grant.

DOH is proposing a 15% set-aside of \$1,815,797 to support public service activities including crisis housing for young adults experiencing homelessness as well as shelter diversion activities. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until June 15, 2018.

DOH is also proposing, via an amendment to the allocation plan, that a portion of this set-aside be utilized by municipalities for foundation testing associated with crumbling foundations. Letters of intent to apply for the public service set-aside for crumbling foundation testing will be accepted until June 15, 2018 with applications due by September 17, 2018.

The deadline for applications requesting FFY 18 project funding was April 12, 2018. DOH received 16 applications requesting total funding of \$10,578,210.

¹According to DOH, the majority of the Carry Forward balance has accumulated as a result of unexpended technical assistance funding. Administrative funding balances can only be carried forward to support administrative expenses.

²The amount of funds used to pay administrative costs in excess of \$100,000 shall not exceed 2% of the aggregate annual grant, or \$242,106 (for a maximum FFY 18 admin allocation of \$342,106). ³States may use up to 1% of the allocation to provide technical assistance to local governments and nonprofit organizations, for community development activities.

⁴ FFY 16 funding supports 2 positions while 2.2 positions remain vacant. FFY 18 funding assumes 4.2 positions will be funded.
