Grant-in-aid and Loan Programs - Economic development

Manufacturing Assistance Act (MAA) – MAA is a multipurpose program which provides different types of financing for businesses and infrastructure development. The Department of Economic and Community Development may provide grants or lend the funds or use them to guarantee bank loans or establish credit lines. The funds will be used to fund general MAA assistance packages for businesses and business development programs with partners who help support the economic development goals of the State. DECD reports that \$188,302,820 in MAA projects are currently in the pipeline, which includes funding for the final two projects in the First Five Program.

First Five – DECD also uses the MAA to fund its "First Five" program, also known as "Next Five". Through the program, DECD may provide loans, tax incentives, and other forms of economic development assistance to up to 15 businesses committing to create jobs and invest capital within the existing law's timeframes.

The commissioner's authority to provide First Five assistance expires June 30, 2016. There are 13 companies in the First Five program. DECD has committed \$256.6 million in MAA loans or grants to these projects. DECD's investment will leverage almost \$1.3 billion in private investment. The final two slots available in the program are anticipated to be filled by the June 30th sunset date.

Small Business Express Program – The funds will be used to recapitalize and continue the Small Business Express Program (EXP). The Small Business Express Program (EXP) provides loans and grants to Connecticut's small business to spur job creation and growth. Assistance is provided through the three programs summarized in the table below:

Small Business Express Data (as reported by DECD on 12/31/2015)

Manufacturing Innovation Fund –The fund targets financial assistance to support the growth, innovation, and progress of Connecticut's advanced manufacturing sector. It provides matching grants to manufacturers to assist with purchase of equipment as well as research and development costs.

The MIF will assist manufacturers in key competitiveness areas complementing DECD's economic development strategy and its programs. The mission is to create innovation excellence in the State; strengthen the supply chain network; and ensure continuous workforce development.

Grant-in-ad to the Northeast CT Economic Development Alliance – DECD has not received any applications nor has it been on bond commission. The Department proposes these funds be cancelled.

Minority business enterprise assistance program to assist such businesses in obtaining surety for capital construction projects – This program provides assistance to minority business enterprises requiring assistance to secure the financial instruments necessary to bid on public works contracts. The administering partner, Hartford Economic Development Co., has received \$1,448,000 in applications to date.

Grant-in-aid and loan programs - Brownfields

Regional Brownfield Redevelopment Program – The program provides financial assistance for environmental investigations and remediation activities. DECD provides qualified applicants funds in the form of low interest loans and grants. In calendar 2015, DECD awarded \$38.5 million to 55 projects across the state, bringing the total

funding contracted for brownfield remediation since 2012 to more than \$102 million; DECD has awarded an additional \$38 million of funding that is expected to be put under contract in the next 6-9 months.

First Five Brownfields Program for state-owned property – This funding will support the remediation, and marketing of five geographically diverse state-owned contaminated properties (i.e., brownfields) for private development.

In 2015, DECD and the City of New Haven partnered to market the former DOT bus garage at 470 James Street for redevelopment. DECD and the City of New Haven partnered to advance the redevelopment of this vacant parcel through a City RFP conducted in the summer of 2015. A locally-based team of developers have proposed to adaptively reuse the former CT Transit bus garage into a 100,000 square foot tech-campus including a restaurant, open space and fitness facilities. DECD will be providing a \$5.5 million grant to the developers to fund the abatement, demolition and remediation of contaminated soils and hazardous building materials.

Agency Projects and Programs

Flexible Housing Program – This funding supports the development and rehabilitation of affordable housing in the form of grants or loans for projects selected by the agency on a competitive basis through specific funding rounds or through an application process in which applications are accepted on a rolling basis. In 2015, along with the Connecticut Housing Finance Authority, the state Department of Housing completed 2,312 units of housing, with 1,643 of them affordable. An additional 3,112 units are currently under construction, of which 2,570 will be affordable.

Housing Trust Fund – Funding provides financial assistance (which may be in the form of grants or loans) to a wide variety of affordable housing programs and projects statewide, including affordable housing for extremely low-income residents as well as workforce housing that is affordable to households with an income of up to 120% of the area median income. HTF funding supports rehabilitation projects and the construction of new units.

Grant-in-aid and Loan Programs

Grants-in-aid for Incentive Housing Program– This funding finances grants-in-aid for the Incentive Housing Zone (IHZ) program. Approximately 72 municipalities have applied for financing through the program. DOH is now offering IHZ funding on a rolling basis. Ten municipalities have adopted incentive housing zones, of which, 2 municipalities have created affordable housing projects.

Background: Chapter 124b of the general statutes provides incentives to municipalities for creating Incentive Housing Zones (IHZ) in eligible locations, such as near transit facilities, an area of concentrated development or an area that, because of existing, planned or proposed infrastructure, is suitable for development as an IHZ.

Nursing Facilities Diversification Program – The Nursing Facilities Diversification Program provides financial assistance to the owners of nursing facilities that are licensed by the CT Department of Public Health so that they can change or diversify their business model in a way that supports individuals on Medicaid who need Long Term Supports and Services (LTSS) but who can reside in community-based facilities rather than more expensive nursing home facilities. In 2015, three Nursing Home Facilities applied and were granted funding through the State Bond Commission.

Homeless Prevention and Response Fund (HPRF) – Established during the 2015 legislative session, this new fund provides capital funding to eligible property owners to make needed repairs or provide operating subsidies to uninhabited units. As a condition for this funding property owners will rent these units to individuals who are homeless in connection with DOH's rapid rehousing or supportive housing program. The HPRF is a statewide initiative designed to assist individuals and families as they transition from homelessness and into housing through housing supports and strategies with the ultimate goal of housing stability.

On January 29, 2016 the SBC approved \$750,000 in HPRF funding to enable DOH's administrator to begin the outreach process to landlords as well as to begin to process applications and loan information from interested landlords. DOH is in the process of procuring an administrator through an open RFP process.

Main Street Investment Fund – The Main Street Initiative provides grants of up to \$500,000 to certain municipalities for eligible projects that develop or improve their commercial centers to: (1) attract small business, (2) promote commercial viability, and (3) improve aesthetics and pedestrian access. To be eligible, a project must be part of a plan previously approved by the municipality's governing body. Applications for the current round of grants under the Main Street Fund Program are due on May 23, 2016.

Shoreline Resiliency Fund – The fund provides shoreline homeowners and businesses subject to coastal flooding with low-interest loans to elevate their homes and businesses from future severe weather and flooding. The program focuses on assisting residents

who do not qualify for receiving federal disaster aid and would otherwise have to pay significant out-of-pocket expenses for the preventative upgrades.

Since the inception of the program in July 2014, approximately 270 homeowners have inquired about the program and indicated their interest in applying for funding under this program. Seven applicants closed the loans in the amount of approximately \$900,000 total. There are about nine active applicants at the various stages of the application process.

Energy Conservation Loan Fund - The fund provides financing at below market rates to single-family and multi-family residential property owners for the purchase and installation of cost-saving energy conservation improvements. Loans may not exceed \$25,000 for single family properties (1-4 units), or up to \$3,500 per unit for multi-family properties (up to a maximum of \$100,000 per building) for a period of 10 years for eligible improvements. Loan repayment proceeds are returned to the pool of funds for the program and used to make additional program loans. In fiscal year 2015, 178 homes participated in the program.

Emergency Mortgage Assistance Program – This funding supports temporary mortgage payment assistance to eligible homeowners who are facing foreclosure due to a financial hardship. CHFA administers this program and provides eligible homeowners with up to 60 months of mortgage assistance. Loan terms are determined on an individual basis. CHFA assisted 247 individuals and families through this program in 2014 and 198 in 2015.

Grant-in-aid Programs

Grants-in-aid to community health centers and primary care organizations for the purchase of equipment, renovations, improvements, and expansion of facilities - The funds support capital improvements by private or municipal organizations in Connecticut that receive funding from DPH to operate health care or support programs on the agency's behalf. Typically this involves expansion and renovation of facilities and new or replacement medical equipment. The State Bond Commission allocated the \$2,000,000 balance of this account to United Community & Family Services to assist with construction of a new larger health center in Griswold.

Grants-in-aid to public water systems for drinking water projects – The funds will be used for a new DPH grant program for eligible drinking water projects approved for loans under the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) program. The grants are limited to: (1) 50% of eligible project costs for systems serving up to 10,000 people

and (2) 30% of eligible project costs for systems serving more than 10,000 people. DPH is also permitted to award grants to forgive the principal on DWSRF loans.

Eligible public water systems include: (1) water companies (private or municipal) that serve at least 25 people or 15 year-round service connections and (2) nonprofit noncommunity water systems (i.e. facilities served by their own water supply), excluding public water systems that are public service companies. Eligible public water systems that are for-profit companies may not receive additional financial assistance under the grant program.

DPH submitted a request for allocation of \$32,000,000 in support of current project priorities for consideration by the Bond Commission and is awaiting allocation at a future Bond Commission meeting. The balance of the approved funding will be requested for allocation to priority projects after allocation and obligation of the initial \$32,000,000.

Grants-in-aid for hospital-based emergency service facilities – A request utilizing \$5,000,000 of the funds were submitted to the Bond Commission for consideration and not approved. The identified recipients have not requested any additional consideration of the funding. Additionally, DPH was never able to receive a completed application for the remaining \$878,050 from Norwalk Hospital.
