### **Revenues:**

Cannabis revenues include a <u>cannabis excise tax</u>, the 6.35% state sales tax, a 3% <u>municipal sales tax</u>, and <u>associated licensing and fees</u>. The first table below provides cannabis revenues by type, FY 24 actual collections and FY 25 – 28 projections (as of January 2025). The second table provides the revenues by fund.

### **Cannabis Tax Distribution**

### **Expenditures:**

Cannabis related expenditures occur in three separate funds: the Cannabis Regulatory Fund, the Social Equity and Innovation Fund, and the Prevention and Recovery Services Fund.

### **Cannabis Regulatory Fund:**

The Cannabis Regulatory Fund (CRF) provides funding to ten agencies (DCP, DPS, DOT, DMV, DRS, DPH, OAG, AES, UHC, DECD) to cover the costs of implementing the authorized activities under the Responsible and Equitable Regulation of Adult-Use Cannabis Act (RERACA). The fund is supported by a transfer from the General Fund in FY 24 and FY 25.<sup>1</sup>

#### Social Equity and Innovation Fund:

This fund supports the administrative costs of the Social Equity Council (SEC). Established under PA 21-1 JSS, the SEC's stated mission is to ensure that the adult-use cannabis program is grown equitably and that funds from the adult-use cannabis program are brought back to the communities most negatively impacted by the prohibition, criminalization and stigmatization of cannabis and cannabis-related public policies.

This fund is supported by 60% of revenue collected from the cannabis excise tax in FY 24 through FY 26 and 65% in FY 27 through FY 28 and conversion fees.

Through the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services, this fund supports (1) substance abuse prevention, treatment, and recovery services and (2) substance abuse data collection and analysis.
