PART IV. CAPITAL BUDGET

Summary

PA 18-178, the 2018 bond act, revised FY 19 bond authorizations downward by a net of \$224.3 million, all from General Obligation (GO) bonds. A total of \$182 million of new or increased GO bonds were authorized in the act, as detailed in Table 1. A total reduction of GO bond authorizations of \$466.3 million was made, as shown in Table 2. \$60 million of the reduction was authorized for years after FY 19; the net reduction effective for FY 19 was \$406.3 million. The revised total of GO bonds effective for FY 19 is \$1,393.7 million, down from \$1,618 as authorized in the original budget.

No changes to authorization amounts were made to Clean Water Fund Revenue or Special Tax Obligation bonds in the act. Total authorizations for FY 19 remain at \$350.3 million and \$1,574.4 million respectively.

Programmatic Changes

Besides changes to overall authorization levels, several programmatic changes and/or obligations of existing authorizations were included in the act. Notably, \$5 million of funds previously authorized for school construction project reimbursements was made available for use on school security projects that "involve multimedia interoperable communication systems." The act obligates \$70 million of funds previously authorized for the Economic Development and Manufacturing Assistance Act to programs established or altered in the act, including \$50 million for the Apprenticeship Connecticut initiative and a total of \$20 million for expansion of programs for Connecticut Innovations, Inc. These changes did not change the overall level of authorization or indebtedness to the state.

Statutory Debt Limit

The state's level of General Fund indebtedness to start FY 19 was \$22.7 billion, as estimated by the Treasurer on May 9, 2018. Based on revenue estimates adopted by the Finance, Revenue and Bonding committee on May 9, 2018, the level of indebtedness, including the changes in the bond act is 89.33% of the statutory limit. This is approximately \$170.3 million below the 90% threshold.

Besides the authorization changes described in this section, overall indebtedness increased by approximately \$550 million in FY 18 due to the contract entered into by the Municipal Accountability Review Board (MARB) and the city of Hartford in March, 2018, which stipulated that the state was responsible for repayment of this debt under specified conditions. This was viewed by the Treasurer as evidence of the state's indebtedness under CGS Sec. 3-21, which establishes the debt limit and what is to be counted and exempted from the same.

If the 90% level is reached, a trigger provision in CGS Sec. 2-27b would require the Governor to review each bond authorization for which no obligations have yet been incurred and recommend priorities for repealing them to the Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee. The committee would consider the recommendations and propose whatever legislation it concluded was necessary to repeal any of the authorizations.

The Certificate of State Indebtedness issued by the Office of the State Treasurer on May 9, 2018 indicated the following:
