Mental Health Services for Juvenile Offenders: Proposed Conversion to IICAPS and FFS

- Adolescent Clinical Treatment (ACT) was developed in 2002, replacing Outpatient Substance Abuse and Mental Health Treatment program (OPSAMH)
- 4/13 ACT sites offer Intensive, In-Home Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Services (IICAPS)
- Contracts expire on 7/1/07, creating an opportunity for enhanced services and improved productivity across the state

 CSSD / DCF Joint Strategic Plan seeks better integration and coordination of services, and recognizes that children with mental health needs deserve the best available treatment, regardless of the portal through which they access those services

- Access to quality care for court-involved children and their families requires migration to IICAPS in all program locations
- The collaborative purchasing structure afforded by a fee-for-service approach provides an opportunity for increased clinical productivity, thereby enabling services to more children for comparable dollars.
