## I share some of the **reasons why** I support tolls:

We all know that the state needs revenue to fix our decaying bridges and disintegrating roads. Every day we travel over bridges old enough to have witnessed the passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment (US Constitution). If you've ever taken a family trip by car to our Nation's Capital, you will surely recall all the tolls you paid along the way –New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland.
